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Executive Summary



As the CEO of Southeastern Idaho Community Action Agency (SEICAA), I am proud to present the 2025 Community Needs Assessment. Every three years, SEICAA engages in a robust, data-informed process to understand the causes and conditions of poverty across the seven counties we serve—Bannock, Bear Lake, Bingham, Caribou, Franklin, Oneida, and Power. This report reflects the voices, experiences, and needs of our communities and will serve as a critical guide for our Strategic Plan and Community Action Plan moving forward.

This year’s assessment represents SEICAA’s most extensive and engaged community needs analysis to date. More than 700 community members, partners, and customers participated through surveys, interviews, and focus groups—providing critical insight into the most pressing challenges facing southeastern Idaho. Four consistent themes emerged across all data sources:

- **Affordable Housing:** Cited by nearly 80% of respondents, housing remains the most urgent challenge. Rising costs are displacing residents, straining families, and pushing many to the brink of homelessness.
- **Mental Health and Counseling Services:** The toll of economic hardship, social isolation, and limited access to care is contributing to growing mental health needs across all demographics.
- **Living-Wage Employment:** Many households continue to struggle with stagnant wages and the rising cost of living. Over 7,600 households—12.3% of our population—currently live in poverty.
- **Food Access and Insecurity:** With inflation driving up prices, food insecurity remains alarmingly high. The need for both emergency and sustained food assistance continues to rise.

Beyond the data, what resonates most is the compassion and urgency expressed by those we heard from. Our communities care deeply about one another and want real, sustainable solutions.

At SEICAA, we take these findings seriously. They will directly inform our program priorities, funding strategies, and partnerships in the years ahead. We are committed to innovative, community-based solutions that reflect the real challenges—and the deep resilience—of the people we serve.

Thank you to every resident, staff member, partner, and elected official who contributed to this process. Your voice shapes the work we do. Together, we remain dedicated to building stronger, more equitable communities in southeastern Idaho.

Purpose

A Community Needs Assessment (CNA) is a process conducted by all Community Action Agencies every three years to determine the underlying causes and conditions of poverty within the communities served and to identify the available resources to address the unmet needs of the community's most vulnerable residents. The CNA is the first phase of the Results Oriented Management and Accountability (ROMA) Cycle, grounding and guiding the work to develop and implement programs and services. The CNA guides planning and programming to meet community needs, to build on strengths and resources of local communities, and to aid in the reduction of barriers to self-sufficiency for families in poverty. Leadership and governing bodies use quantitative and qualitative data to enrich services and to inform decisions.

Methodology

The CNA was developed based on the requirements of the CSBG Organizational Standards.

CSBG Organization Standards

Standard 3.1 The organization conducted a community assessment (CA) and issued a report within the past 3 years.

Standard 3.2 As part of the CA, the organization collects and includes current data specific to poverty and its prevalence related to gender, age, and race/ethnicity for their service area(s).

Standard 3.3 The organization collects and analyzes both qualitative and quantitative data on its geographic service area(s).

Standard 3.4 The CA includes key findings on the causes and conditions of poverty and the needs of the communities assessed.

Standard 3.5 The governing board formally accepts the completed CA.

In October of 2023, SEICAA began its planning phase for the development of its 2025 Community Assessment Report. The Agency gathered qualitative and quantitative data through December of 2024. During that time, **557** community members across all **7** counties in our service area provided direct feedback on the challenges they see facing our communities as related to poverty and community resources. The 33-question survey generated a massive 4.5 times greater response than in the previous years surveyed. Customer Satisfaction Surveys were also distributed to the participants we serve, and **105** individuals/families responded regarding questions about how the Agency is doing from the customer's point of view. In addition, as part of the Community Assessment process, qualitative data was collected at **4** focus group meetings where **38** community partners collaborated on causes and conditions of poverty in our service areas. These interview panels were attended by **8** of our elected County Commissioners.

Key Findings

The **Community Needs Survey** was designed to gather information on what our CSBG constituents perceive as being their top needs as related to poverty and community resources. The Survey had a two-fold objective to gather data on individuals' perceptions of the greatest needs in their communities and to gather information on respondents' own greatest barriers to financial stability. A total of 557 community members across all 7 counties in our service area provided direct feedback on the challenges they face. These community members span across several key sectors of the communities we serve, including:

- Faith-Based Organizations
- Community-Based Organizations
- Non-Profit Organizations
- Public and Private Sector Organizations
- Educational, Health, and Government Institutions

The 33-question survey generated a massive 4.5 times greater response than in the previous years surveyed. The top 4 greatest needs identified from those surveys are listed below in the highest priority order:

1. **Affordable Housing** – 79.55%
2. **Mental Health & Counseling** – 39.88%
3. **Jobs (Living Wage)** – 39.26%
4. **Access to Food** – 36.78%

Respondent Data

Sex – Of the 557 people who took the survey 403 identified as female (43.81%) and 143 identified as male (26.19%), while 11 people skipped the question.

Age – The majority of those who took the survey were between the ages of 31 to 60 years old.

- 31 to 40 (16.91%)
- 41 to 50 (22.18%)
- 51 to 60 (21.64%)

Race – Whites were in the ethnic category mostly taking our survey (84.06%). However, all ethnicities were represented in the results expect for middle eastern. Note: White is the race most predominant in our service area (84.55%).

Veterans – Veterans made up 6% of those surveyed. Note: Veterans make up 6.79% of our service area's population.

Household Make-Up – Survey results indicated 52.62 % of respondents live in households with 2 adults, 25.50% reported 1 adult in the household, and the rest (21.88%) reported more than 2 adults living in the household. 43.42% of those surveyed indicated they were a 2-parent household, while 12.78% reported just being a single parent household, and 5.45% reported they were grand-parents rising grandchildren.

Education Levels – The majority of those surveyed (96.66%) had a high school or higher education level, 67.35% reporting some higher education and degrees. At first glance, those education levels seem adequate for sustaining self-sufficiency. However, the next questions indicated that 42.00% of those surveyed reported having barriers to higher education. The reasons given range from the high cost (23.99%) to lack of childcare and transportation.

Results

Housing – We asked respondents what their current housing situation was and most reported that they owned their home (62.13%) and 26.92% reported they rented a home or apartment (1.35% in subsidized housing). 9.42% reported they were homeless or living with friends or family. When asked what they thought about housing in their community most felt it was not affordable or available (52.56%) some admitted they did not have knowledge about housing in their community (18.61%) and others reported that housing was available but limited (15.54%).

Mental Health – There was only 1 question directly related to mental health in the survey. The question was regarding family stress levels since the COVID-19 Pandemic. Many reported their stress levels remained the same as before the pandemic (36.51%), while 28.01% said they experienced greater stress and anxiety levels during the pandemic but are now feeling better. 25.52% are still experiencing stress, anxiety, and depression. 75 out of 557 or 7.42% of people who took the survey skipped the question. Since mental health and counseling services were listed as the second highest need (38.88%) in survey results, it is likely that increased mental illnesses are steaming from other factors besides the pandemic.

Income/Employment – 53.51% responded that the head of the household (HOH) was employed full-time, 25.24% responded that the HOH was retired, 12.90% responded the HOH was unemployed, 8.83% responded they were either part-time, working multiple jobs, or at temporary jobs. While 5.38% skipped the question. If the respondent indicated the HOH was unemployed, they were asked to explain why. 47.06% indicated they were not employed because the HOH was disabled, or they were not able to work (20.32%).

Financial Status – We asked, “Compared to 1 year ago is your family financially worse off, better off, or about the same?” 51.61% of respondents answered they were about the same financially compared to 1 year ago, 33.40% indicated they were worse off, and 15.37% reported to being better off financially. When asked “what keeps you/family from being financially stable?”, the 4 top reasons given were as follows: Live on fixed income (30.54%); Question did not apply to them (29.29%); Living expenses are too high (24.06%); Full-time work does not cover expenses (19.25%).

Food – We asked, “In the last 12 months, was your food supply adequate?” 73.29% responded “Yes” while 26.71% responded “No”. We asked if they answered “No” to their food supply being adequate, choose the closet reason why. The top response was they did not have enough income to purchase enough food.

During the analysis phase, we also determined that the data collected from the previous survey (2022) is similar to the results of this survey in that the greatest concern from community members continues to be affordable housing options. It is worth mentioning the difference in housing costs reported in 2022; at that time, 19.42% of respondents indicated they were paying between \$501 to \$700 for rent/mortgage. Those surveyed this time (26.67%) indicated they are paying over \$1000.00 for housing and 10% of those are paying over \$1400. This indicates an upward spike in the cost of housing in our service area. Health services were also identified in both surveys at the 2nd highest priority level and employment concerns were at 3rd highest priority levels in both surveys. White females were predominately the people who took the surveys both times, however all races were represented in both survey results (except middle eastern).

Customer Satisfaction Surveys

105 customers responded to our 20-question Customer Satisfaction Survey asking questions about how SEICAA is performing from their point of view. Overall, the bulk of SEICAA customers were very satisfied

with SEICAA's services and staff in PY2024. So much so that 100% of those who respondents indicated they would recommend SEICAA to friends and family. Customers indicated they felt welcome and that our facilities were clean (100%). 10 out of 10, or 100% of the Weatherization customers surveyed indicated our work crews were polite and courteous; the job sites were cleaned up after completion and that the program was of benefit to them. 92 out of 94 customers, or 97.87%, indicated they felt their needs were met while only 2 indicated they did not feel their needs were met. 69 out of 70 customers (98.57%) indicated they were helped in a timely manner and 1 customer (1.43%) indicated they were not helped in a timely manner.

Focus Groups Interviews

The qualitative data collection by SEICAA included conducting 4 focus group interviews across 4 different counties. The qualitative data was used to gather their views on a uniform set of questions. The questions focused on three areas: driving forces of poverty, recommended actions to address the issues of poverty, and the most vulnerable populations- those most at risk and potentially with a higher level of need. Thirty-eight people in total attended our focus group sessions, 8 being elected county commissioners.

All 4 focus groups noted three major areas as the primary driving forces/issues that cause poverty in our area, lack of "decent" paying jobs, housing, and the overall cost of living increases. When asked what they thought could be done to address these conditions, all groups articulated the need for more affordable and subsidized housing to be created. There was even a cry to manage and control corporate purchasing of housing to stop gentrification. Several people brought up the need for federal assistance in lowering inflation. While others suggested a more preventative approach which included financial education, preparing to live on a fixed income, and just simply having a "higher education level". When the groups were asked to identify what groups, they would consider to be a vulnerable population, all 4 groups mentioned the elderly and those with disabilities as being the most vulnerable. Single parents were also identified as high risk. Further discussion identified: newly graduated from high school adults because of limited opportunities; and people with criminal records that might prevent them from gaining employment could also potentially be considered a vulnerable group.

Lastly, we had an open discussion about what they thought were the biggest changes in their community over the last 3 years. No surprise that the increase in housing costs and higher inflation was at the forefront of the topic. But further discussion revealed 1 group felt the higher influx of people moving into the areas is a change from 3 years ago and might be a factor in driving up the housing costs. Two of the Focus Groups felt like there has been an increase in drug abuse and mental health issues in their communities during the last 3 years.

SEICAA is very pleased with the participation of those that attended these Focus Group interviews. The information gathered is invaluable in helping us better understand the needs of the communities we serve.

Causes and Conditions of Poverty

Our CNA seeks to better understand the causes and conditions of poverty in the Southeastern Idaho area. The causes of poverty are the system-level forces that result in individuals becoming or remaining impoverished. For example, these forces can include lack of access to childcare services and the rising costs of housing and utilities. The conditions of poverty are the ways in which individuals experience poverty. For example, struggling to afford or access mental health services or relying on public transportation.

In examining the key findings and with the use of our various assessment tools, SEICAA has arrived at the following causes and conditions of poverty that are the most dominant for local agencies, government departments, and key stakeholders to address:

Causes

- 1. Cause #1 – Lack of Affordable Housing:** Across the board, many individuals throughout Southeastern Idaho have growing concerns over the inability to find affordable housing in their area (79.55% of survey respondents). Rental housing vacancies are few and far between and then being able to afford said housing can prove to be a struggle, as Idaho's median income in 2023 was \$67,599 and the poverty rate was 11.1% (according to Idaho Department of Labor's Southeast Idaho labor Force Economic Profile).⁵ Of the 62,365 total households in the report area, 13,697 or 21.96% of the population are housing cost burdened (those that spent more than 30% of the household income on housing costs). Additionally, cost burdened rental households represented 37.01% of all the rental households in the report area, according to the U.S. Census Bureau.⁴
- 2. Cause #2 – High Cost of Living:** Recent inflationary trends, including the cost of food and utilities, have also played a major part in hindering efforts by individuals and families to escape poverty. It is understandable with families struggling to make ends meet that 39.26% of survey respondents indicated that a lack of living wage jobs (\$23.18 per hour in 2025)⁸ in the report area is of increased concern. The current minimum wage is \$7.25 per hour (2025). Using the December 2024 Consumer Price Index released by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the Joint Economic Committee (JEC) State Inflation Tracker¹ has seen cumulative inflation of 21.8% since January 2021.

Conditions

- 1. Condition #1 – Increased risk of Homelessness:** Between a lack of access to affordable housing, and the difficulty of affording said housing, individuals facing poverty or near poverty face increased risk of becoming homeless. According to the US Department of Education, in the report area, of all the 31,789 students enrolled in reported districts during the school year 2109-2020, there were 709 or 2.23% homeless students.² The statewide rate of homeless students at that time was 2.78%. Being forced into homelessness only further complicates efforts to escape poverty and makes general safety and well-being an added concern. This likelihood increases when low-income individuals are burdened by health or mental health issues or having to tend to family members. The Centers for Disease Control³ and Prevention stated in our report area in 2021, there were an average of 16.1% of adults who reported poor mental health in the past month. The State average was 15.1% compared with the United States average of 14.7%.
- 2. Condition #2 – Inability to Purchase Other Necessities:** With families and individuals struggling to make ends meet on housing, food and utilities, many in Southeastern Idaho are basically living paycheck to paycheck. Affording services and products that could prove beneficial in efforts to escape poverty can

seem next to impossible. Owning one's own car can open the door to many opportunities but due to the rising cost of living, many in poverty must rely on public transportation, which can limit their options to access food, or better paying jobs. The report area has a population of 28,126 living in food deserts and a total of 8 census tracts classified as food deserts by the United States Department of Agriculture. The USDA Food Access Research⁶ Atlas defines a food desert as any neighborhood that lacks healthy food sources due to income level, distance to supermarkets, or vehicle access. Childcare is another critical need for families seeking and keeping employment, but without affordable options to place their children in while they work. Balancing work and taking care of children can drastically hinder efforts to climb out of poverty.

Most Vulnerable Populations

This assessment presents an overview of the Southeastern Idaho community based on information gathered from our key informant focus groups. Most participants indicated they believe the elderly and disabled are among our most vulnerable populations. A vulnerable population refers to a group of people who are more likely to experience poor health and who may face barriers to accessing healthcare. These barriers can be social, economic, political, environmental, or related to disability or illness. The other group identified by participants as being vulnerable were the youth and children in our service area. Some broke down the category of youth and children by specifically identifying that they felt children of single parents, or newly graduated students are vulnerable populations.

Elderly Individuals – Aging and elderly community members, those over 65 years old, make up 14.66% or 25,449 people living in our service area.² Many living on fixed incomes are struggling to meet living expenses with the increased cost of housing coupled with inflation in all areas including medicines, food, and utilities.

Disabled Individuals – Disabled community members on fixed incomes are also struggling to meet living expense with the increased cost of housing, inflation in all areas including medicines, food, and utilities. The National Community Action Partnership Assessment tool indicates that 26,291 persons or 15.27% of our service area population have a disability.²

Youth and Children – In the report area 42.76% or 20,432 children are living in households with income below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL)². This indicator is relevant because poverty creates barriers to access, including health services, healthy food, and other necessities that contribute to poor health status. Childcare continues to be a critical need – based on this year's CNA, 29% of our respondents identified lack of childcare as one of the 5 unmet needs for them and the community.

Youth Not Working and Not in School – The total population of youth ages 16-19 in the report area is 11,274, of which 921 or 12.24% are not in school and are not employed.²

Agency Overview

The **Southeastern Idaho Community Action Agency, Inc.** (or **SEICAA**), is a Community Action Agency (CAA) – a private non-profit organization created by the federal government to pursue solutions to and combat the causes of poverty. Other CAAs may be public organizations. To be a CAA, an organization must:

- Meet provisions of the **Economic Opportunity Act of 1964** and/or the **Community Services Block Grant Act of 1982**.
- Receive **Community Services Block Grant (CSBG)** funds.
- Form a **tripartite Board of Directors**, consisting of:
 - 1/3 Low-Income Residents or Their Representatives

- 1/3 Publicly Elected Officials or Their Designees
- 1/3 Private Sector Representatives
- Belong to a **national network** of similar agencies. In our case, we belong to the **National Community Action Partnership**.

SEICAA was established in 1963 as a grassroots initiative by a dedicated group of volunteers who provided noon meals to seniors in Bannock County. Despite the day-to-day challenges of sustaining the program, their commitment to serving the community never wavered. In 1968, recognizing the impact of their work, Bannock County leaders proposed the creation of a recreation and social service neighborhood center—then known as the Bannock County Community Center—to support and expand their efforts. However, it soon became clear that the community's needs extended well beyond meal services, highlighting the demand for broader support programs. SEICAA transitioned into a fully recognized Community Action Agency in 1969 when it was formally incorporated.

SEICAA, in accordance with its geographical designation, serves all seven counties in **Southeast Idaho**, catering towards households from **100% to 200%** of the **federal poverty level (FPL)**. Thanks to the flexibility of CSBG, which distributes funds to provide services aimed at reducing poverty, SEICAA not only addresses various needs but also launches new programs to meet arising challenges.

SEICAA's programs and services are administered by the following divisions:

- SEICAA Community Services
- SEICAA Housing
- SEICAA Self-Help Housing
- SEICAA Weatherization


SEICAA Community Services

Our Community Services division empowers participants by offering a myriad of programs and services that both meet their needs and connect them to approaches for success. This division is funded largely by CSBG to address poverty at the community level. The following programs and services are offered:

- **Basic Needs Assistance** (*Clothing, Food, Hygiene, etc.*)
- **Education Services** (*GED Fee Assistance, School Supplies, etc.*)
- **Information & Referral Services**
- **Holiday Assistance** (*Adopt a Family, Secret Santa, Socks for Seniors, etc.*)
- **Housing Assistance** (*Deposit Assistance, Mortgage Assistance, Rent Assistance, etc.*)
- **Meals on Wheels**
- **Transportation Assistance** (*For employment, education, or medical*)
- **Utility Assistance** (*LIHEAP, Heating Fuel, Utility Deposits, Water Bills, etc.*)

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Meals on Wheels

Our Meals on Wheels program in Bannock County helps homebound Idahoans maintain their independence as they age. While it starts with delivering meals, our program also focuses on building relationships with our participants by providing tailored nutrition, social connection, and safety checks. On average, we save each participant – and their family – **\$169 per day** in assisted living costs.

Increased meal and overhead costs (resulting in a **\$16.00 to-door cost** – up 12% from 2023's \$14.25) and uneven reimbursements (approximately **\$4.50 per meal**) saw our program operate in a deficit (approx. -\$30,000 at the end of 2024). The program was enveloped into our Community Services where we hope CSBG funds can stabilize it and maintain its capacity.

SEICAA Housing

Our housing and facilities divisions work together to provide safe and affordable housing for low-income individuals and families. This division is largely funded by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

For most of 2024, we managed six properties (we sold **The Bridge** in September):

- **Fountain Courts** (8 Units, Multi-Family Complex, Pocatello, ID)
- **SEICAA Manor** (10 Units, Apartments for Homeless and/or Disabled Residents, Pocatello, ID)
- **South Oak** (24 Units, Multi-Family Complex, Blackfoot, ID)
- **St. Anthony Place** (88 Units, Apartments for Disabled and/or Elderly Residents. Pocatello, ID)
- **Station 1938** (10 Units, Studio Suites, Pocatello, ID)
- **The Bridge** (2 Units, Duplex Unit for Servicemen and Servicewomen w/ Family, Pocatello, ID)

This division also administered our Veterans' Services program, which is transitional housing for veterans who face homelessness.

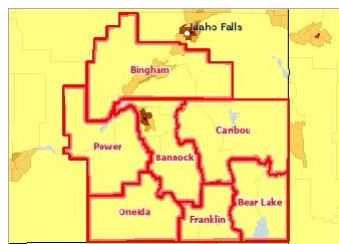

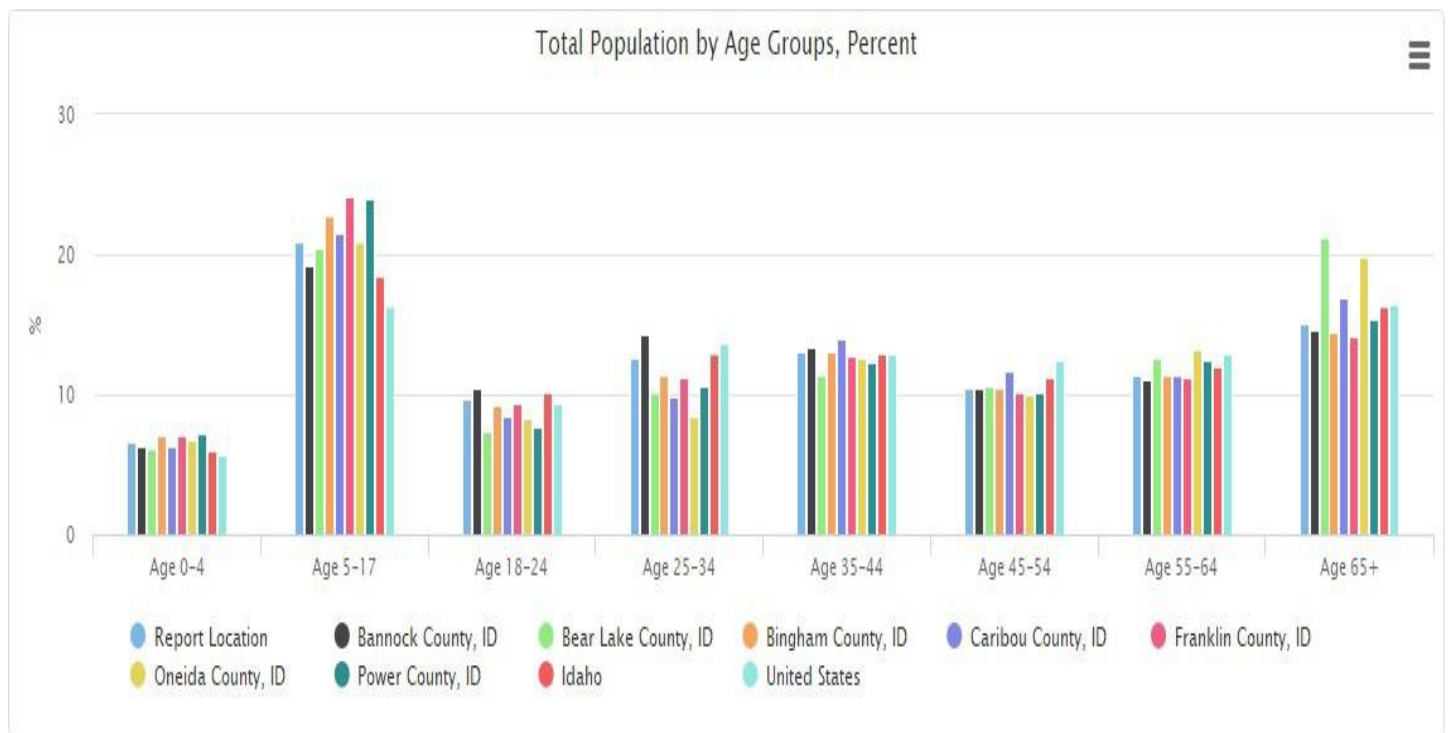

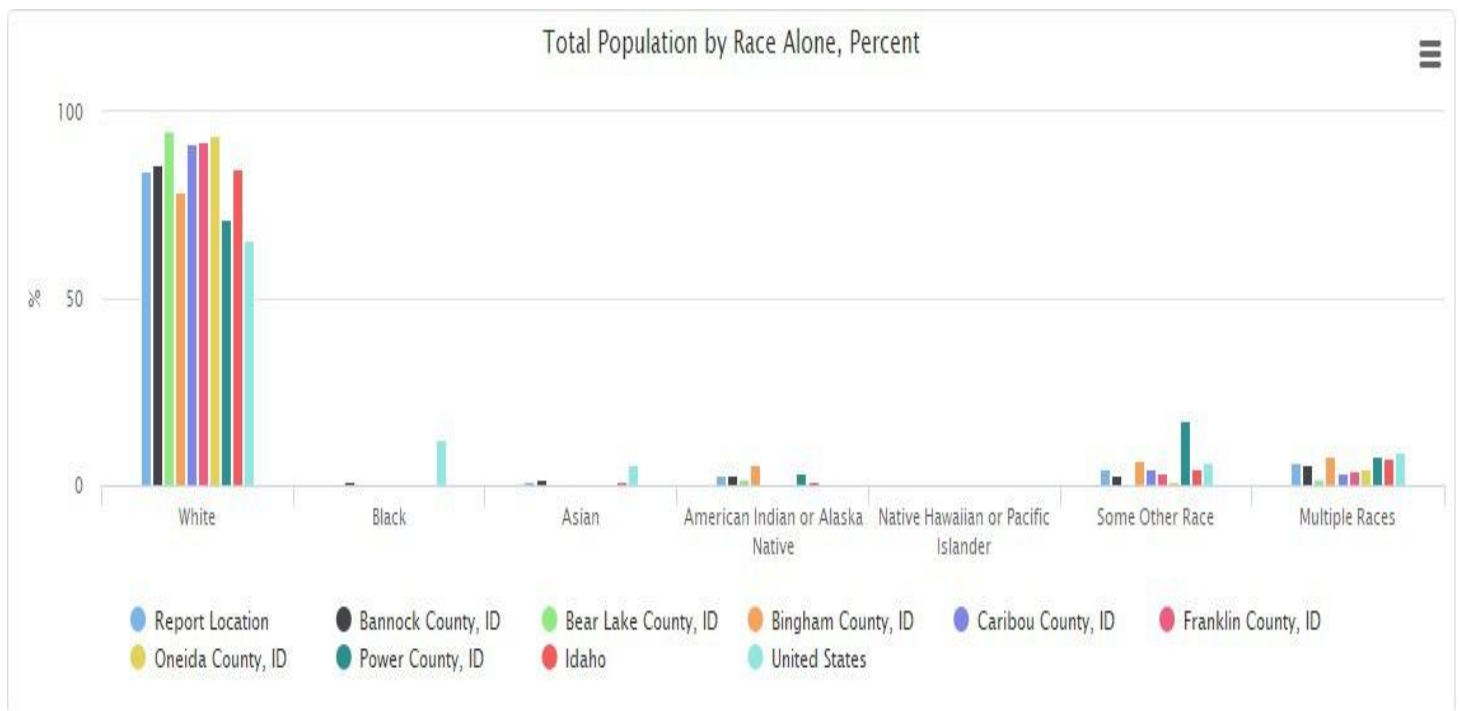

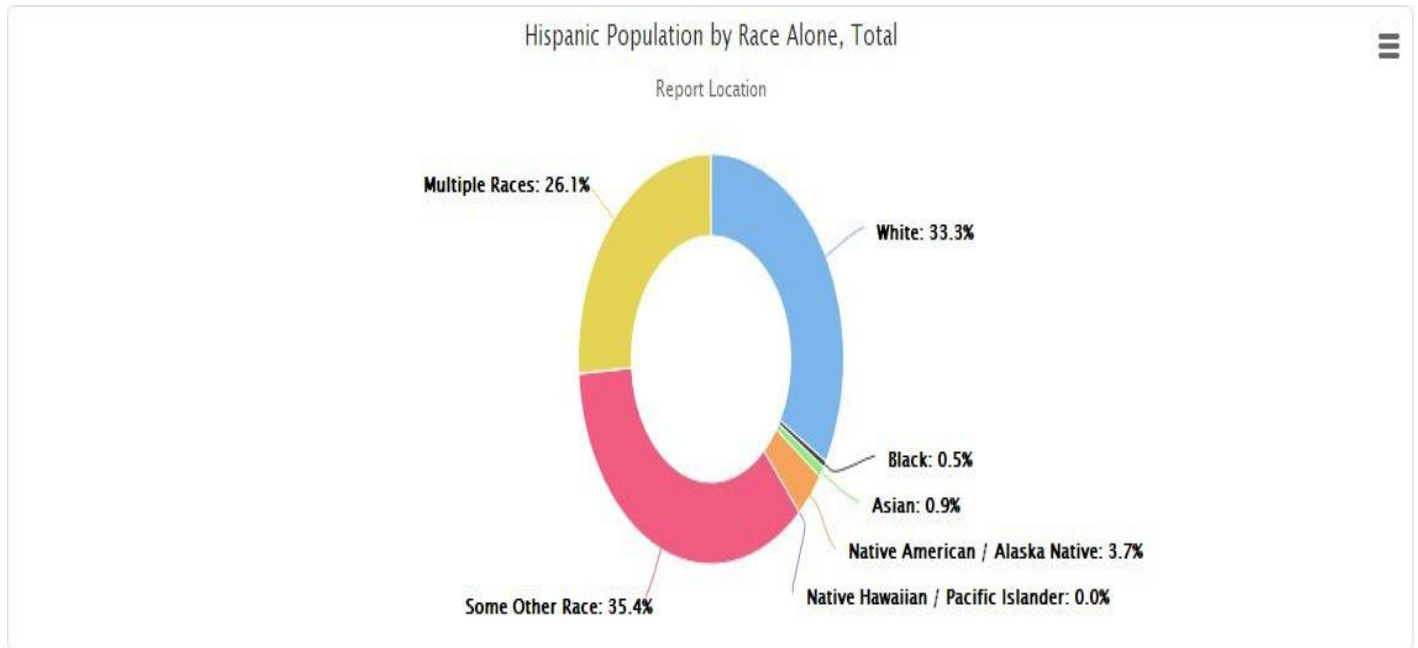

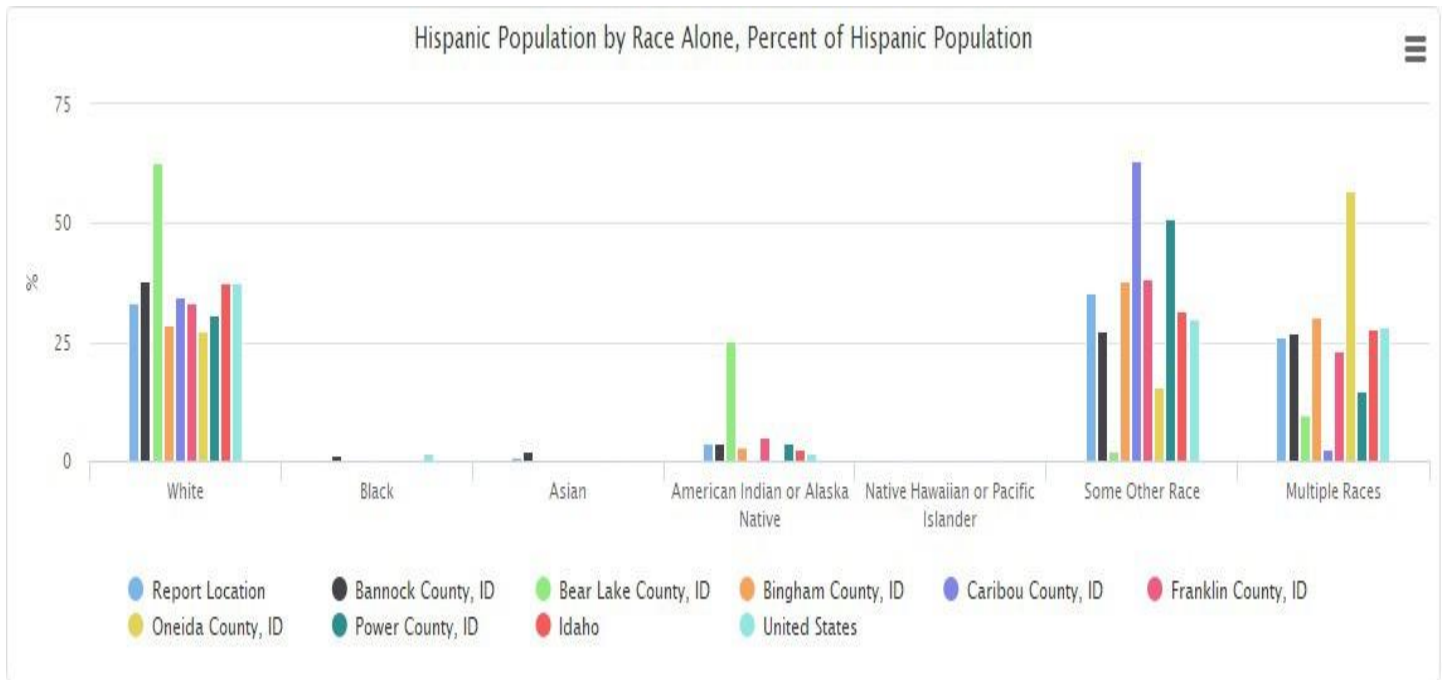

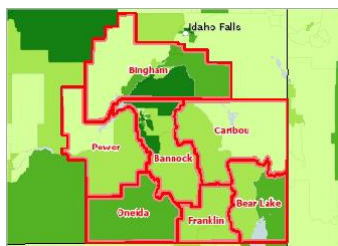

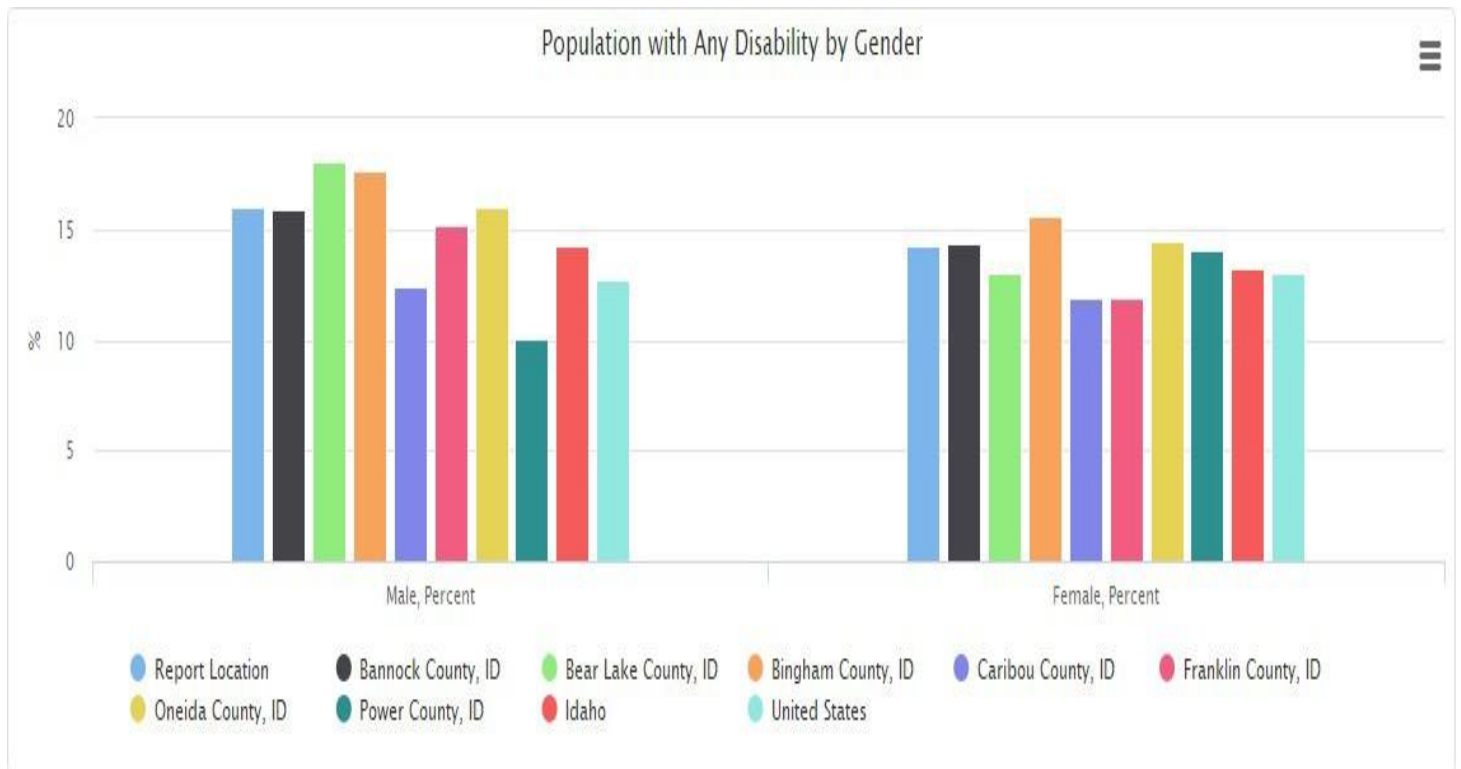

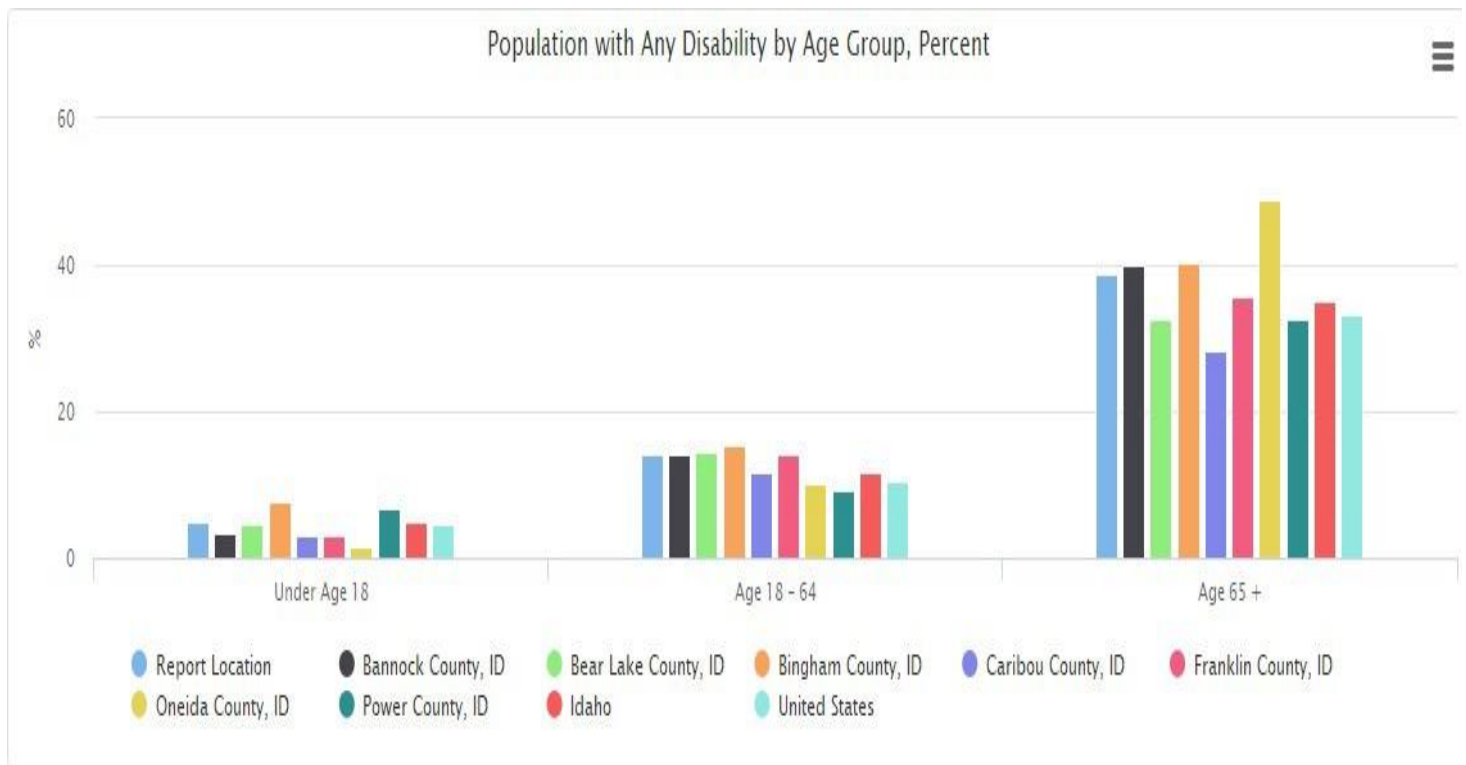

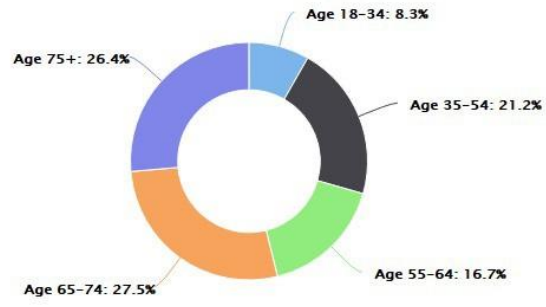

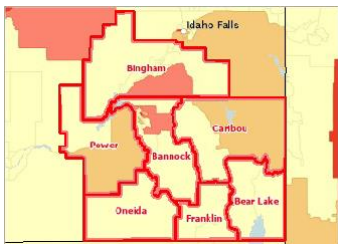

Households with Children (Age 0-17), Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22



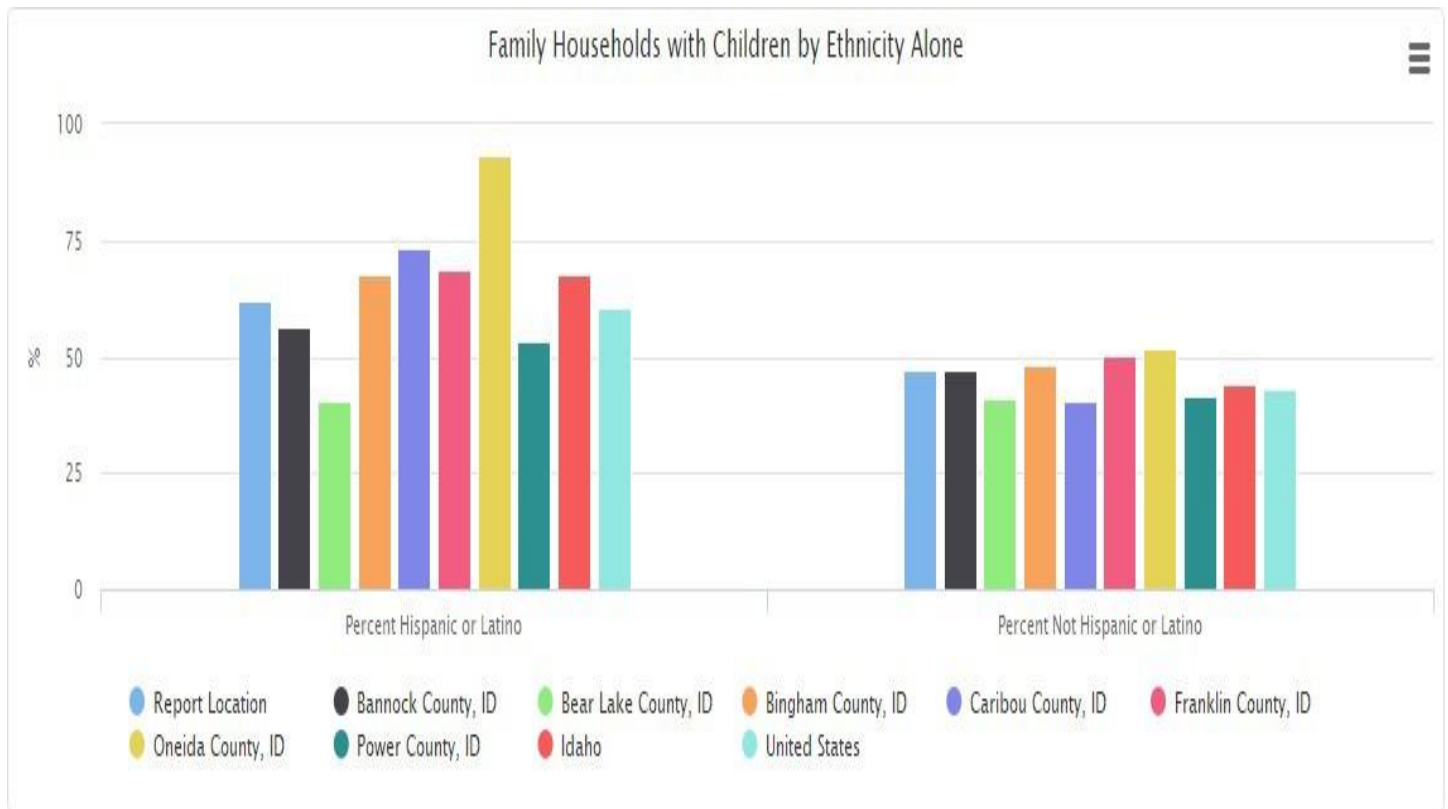

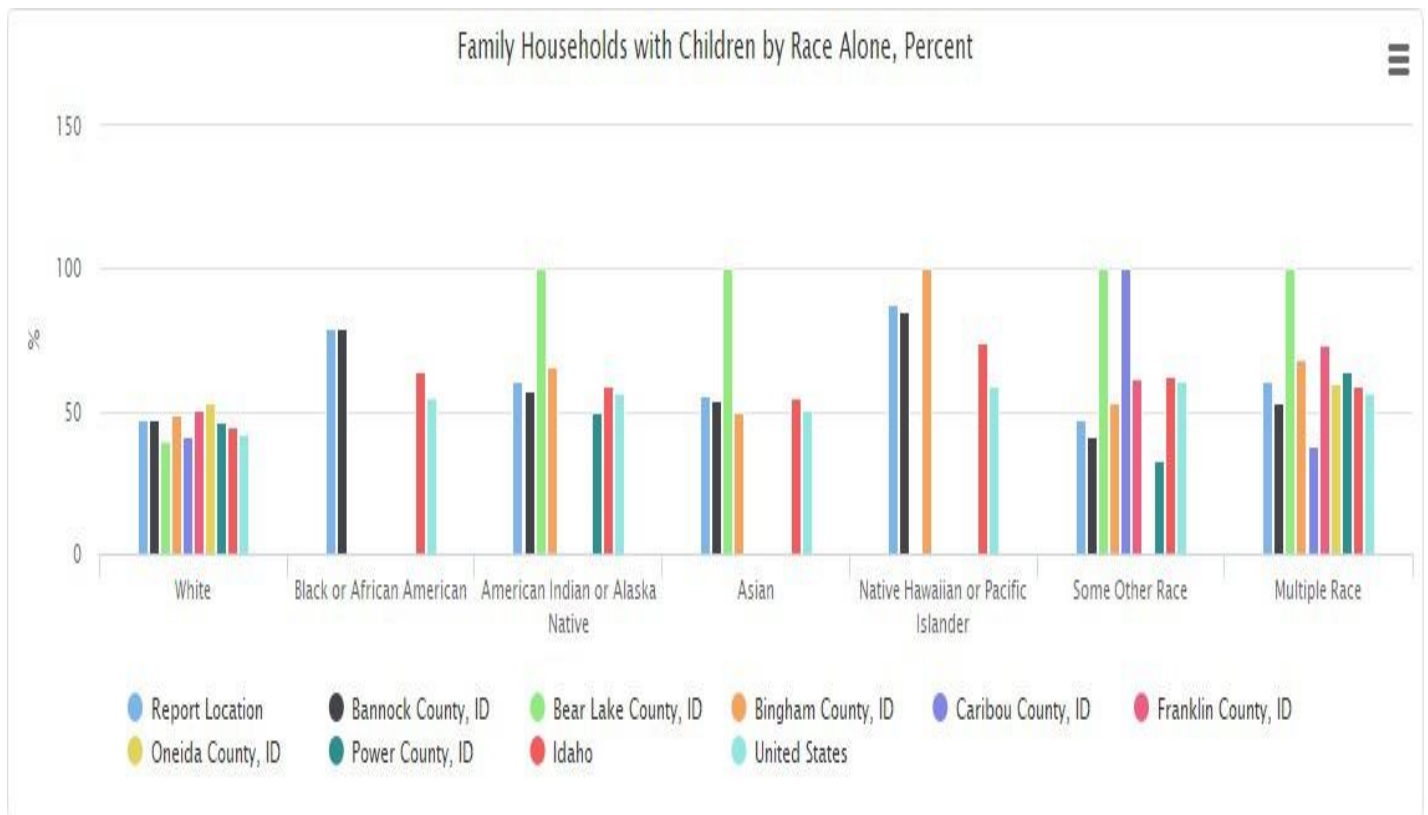

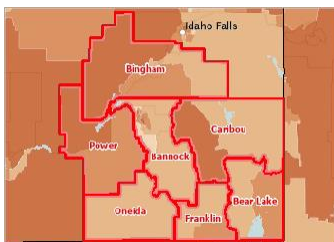

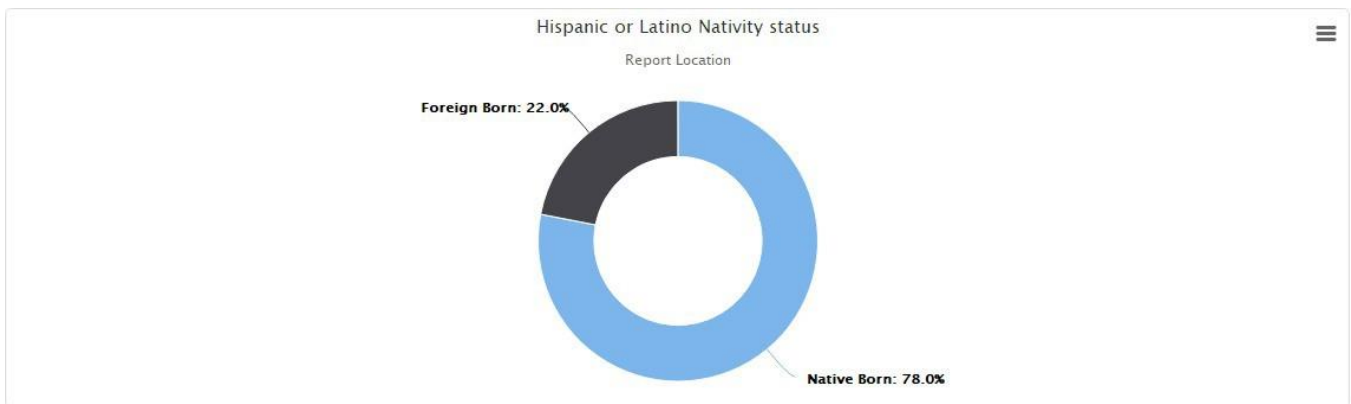

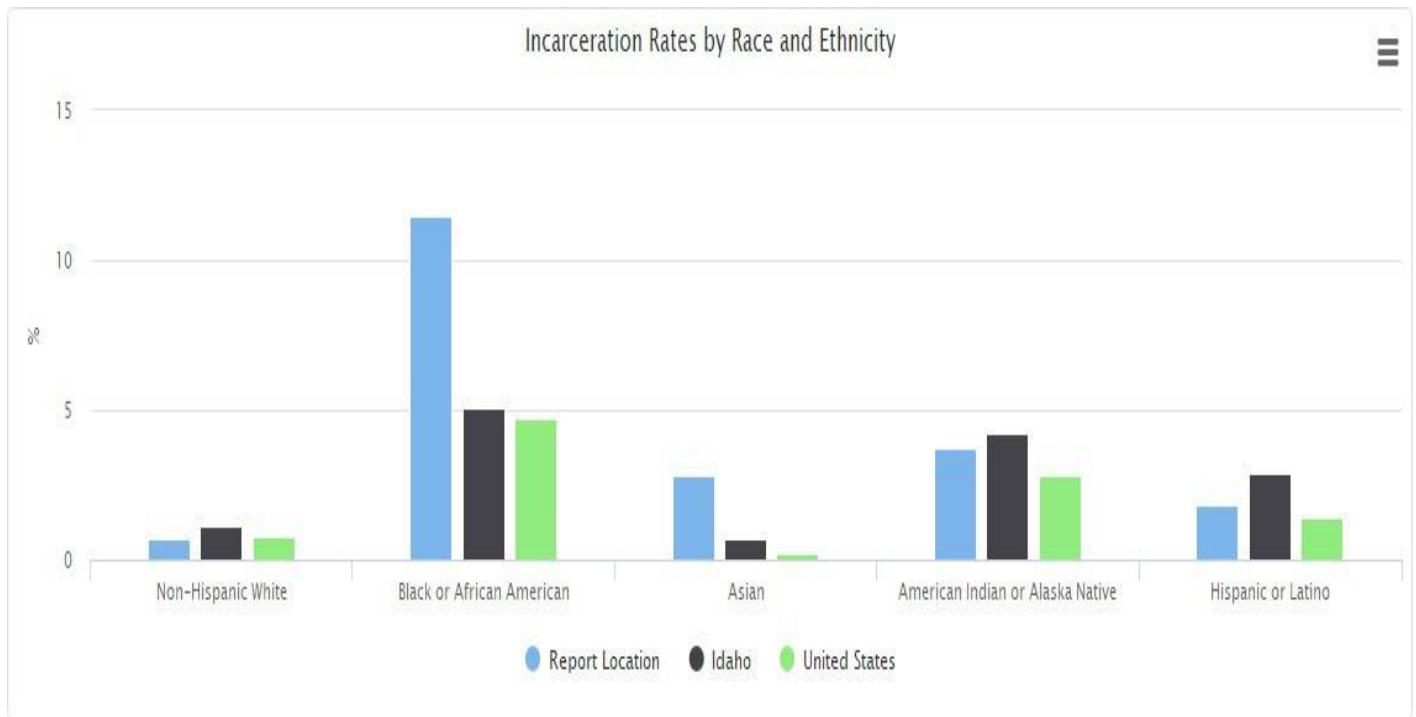

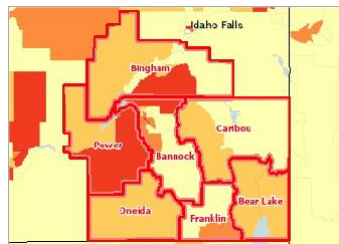

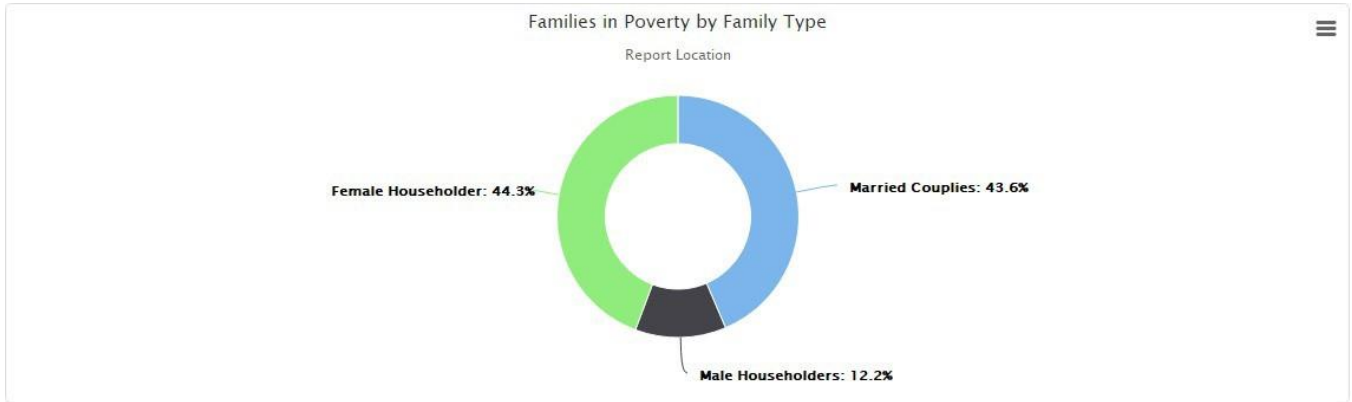

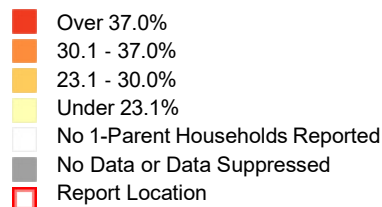

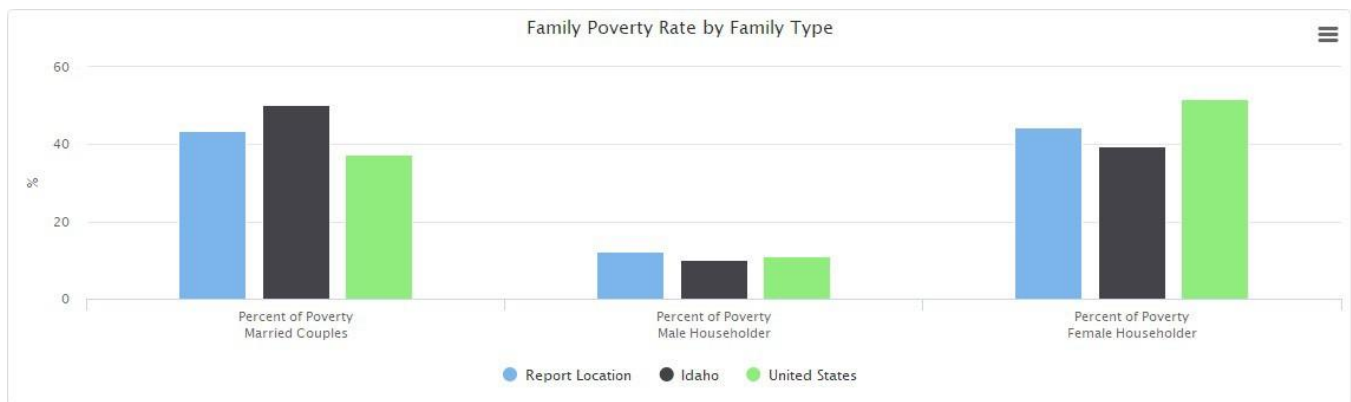

Children Eligible for Free or Reduced-Price Lunch by School Year, 2012-13 through 2021-22

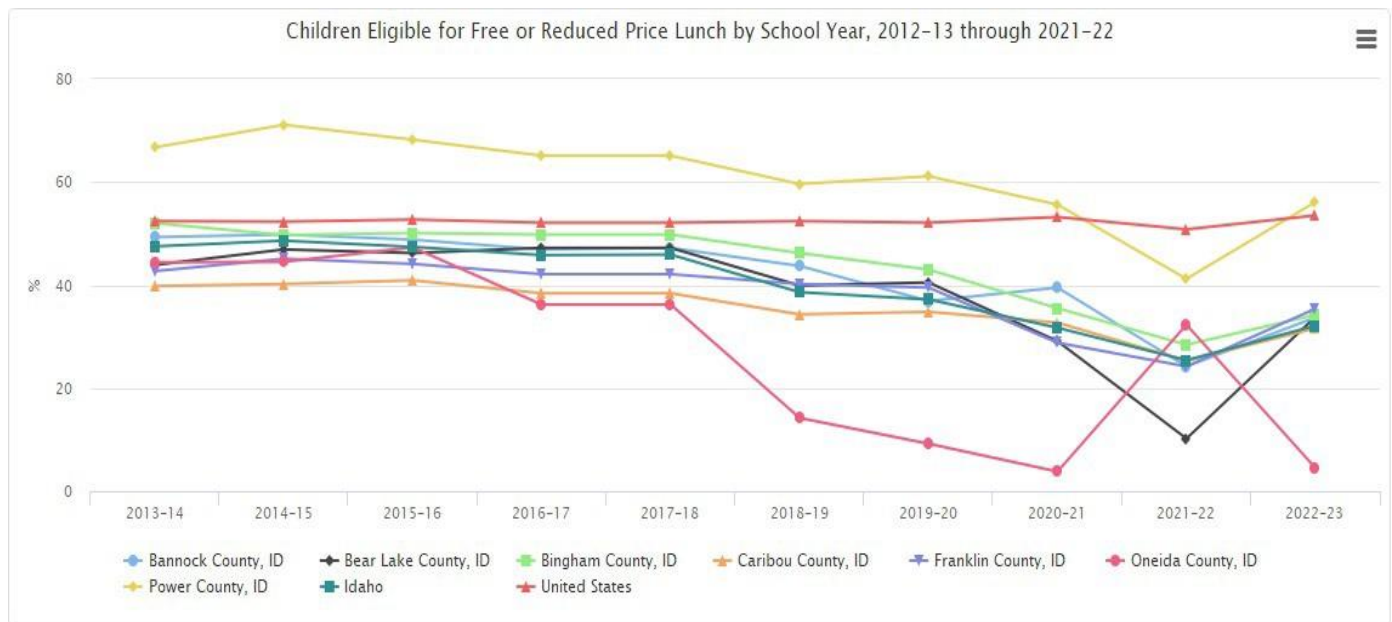

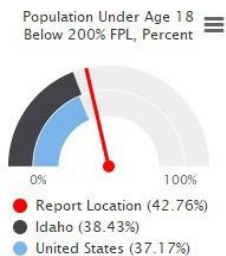

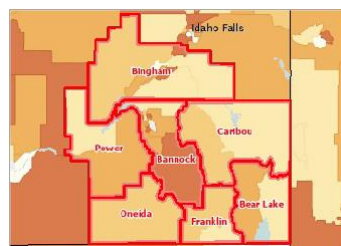

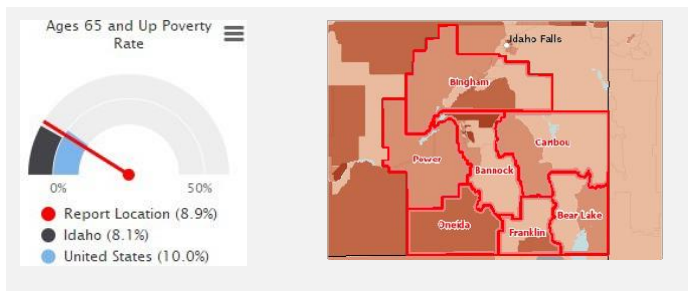

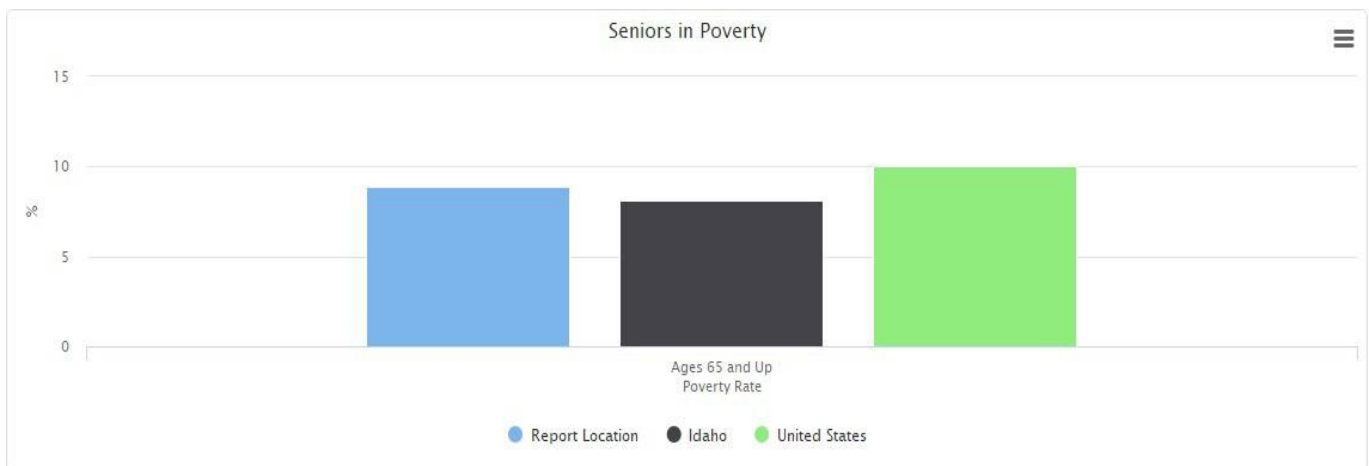

Population Below the Poverty Level, Senior (Age 65+), Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22



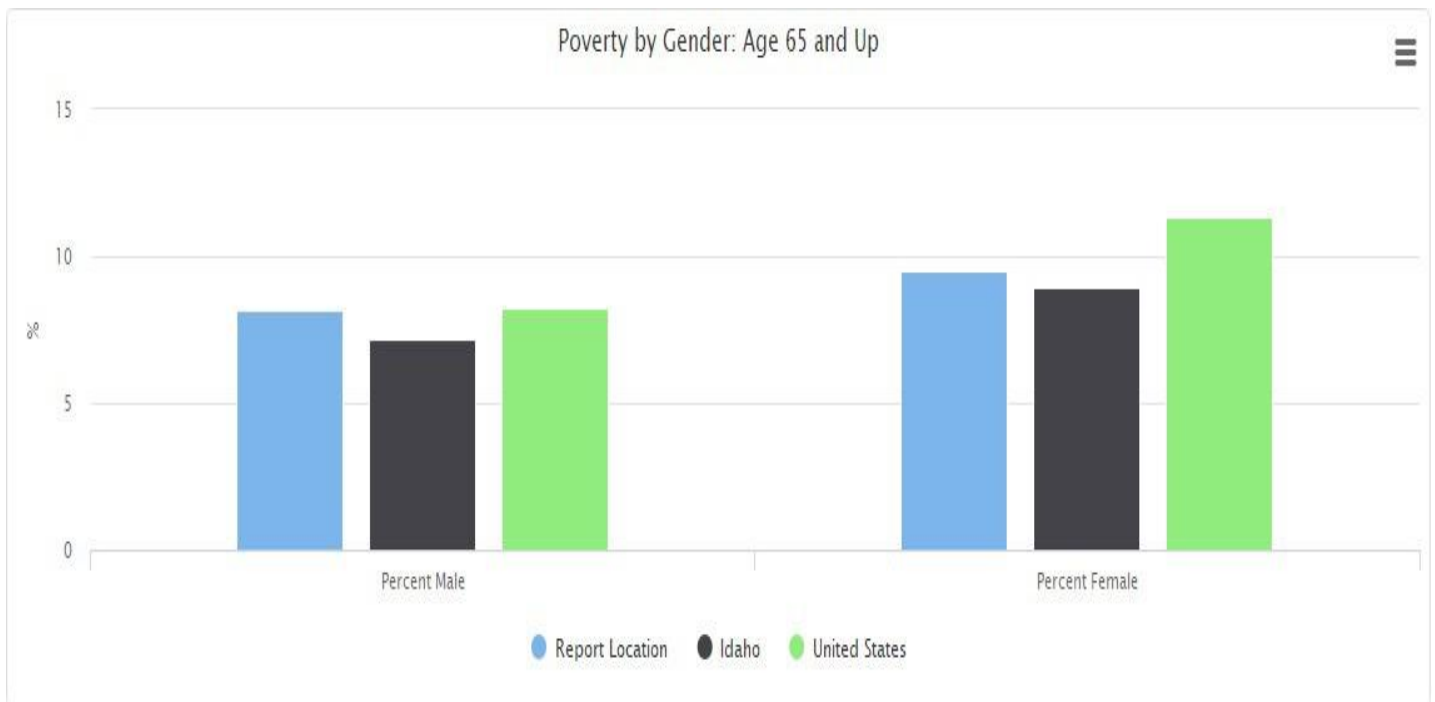

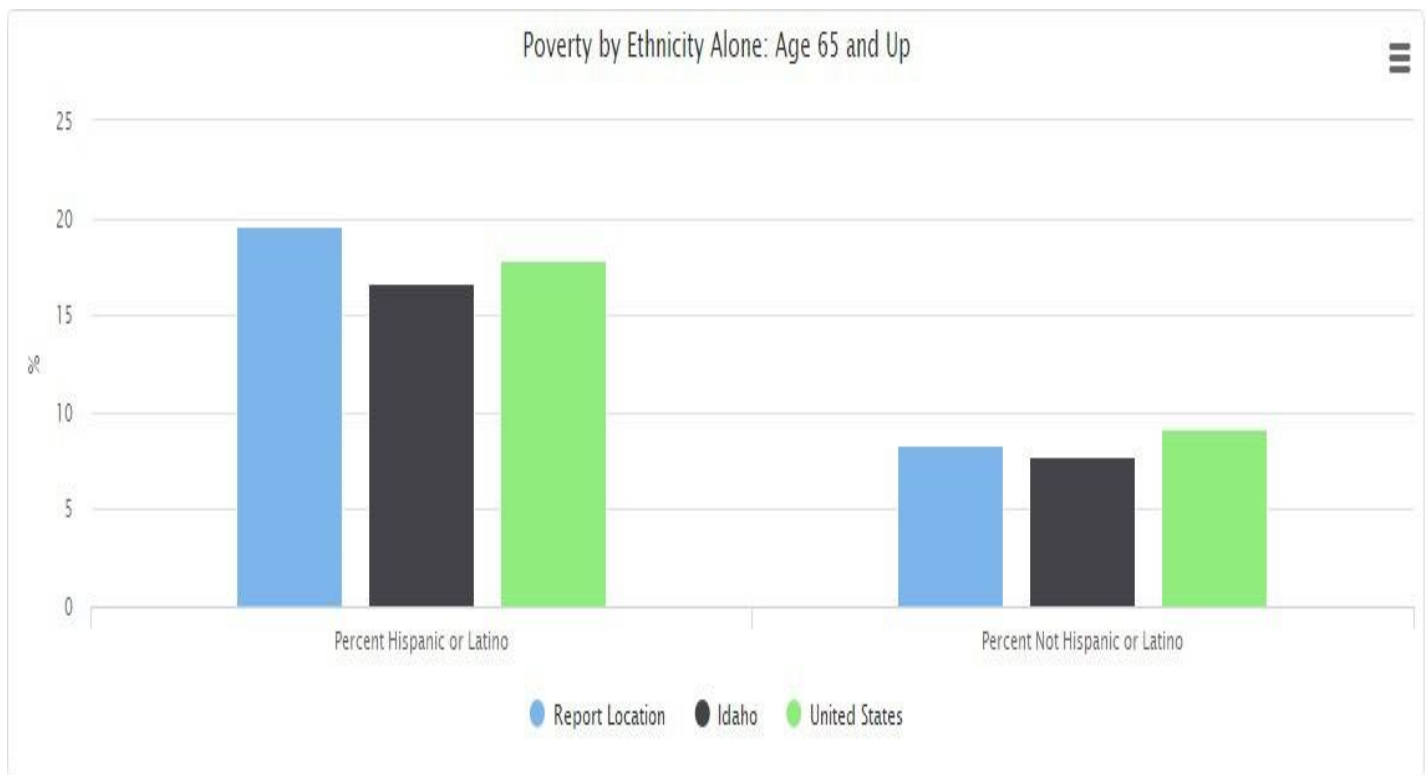

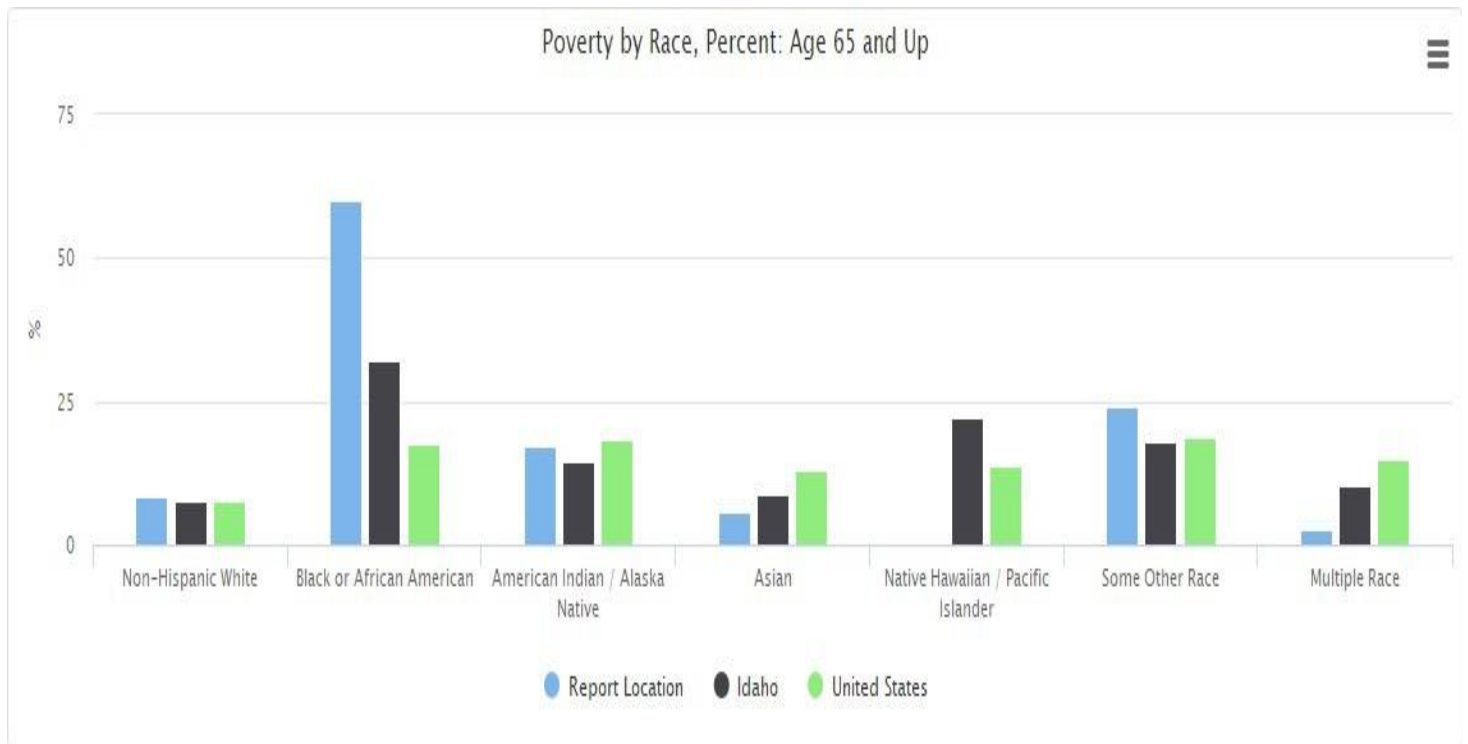

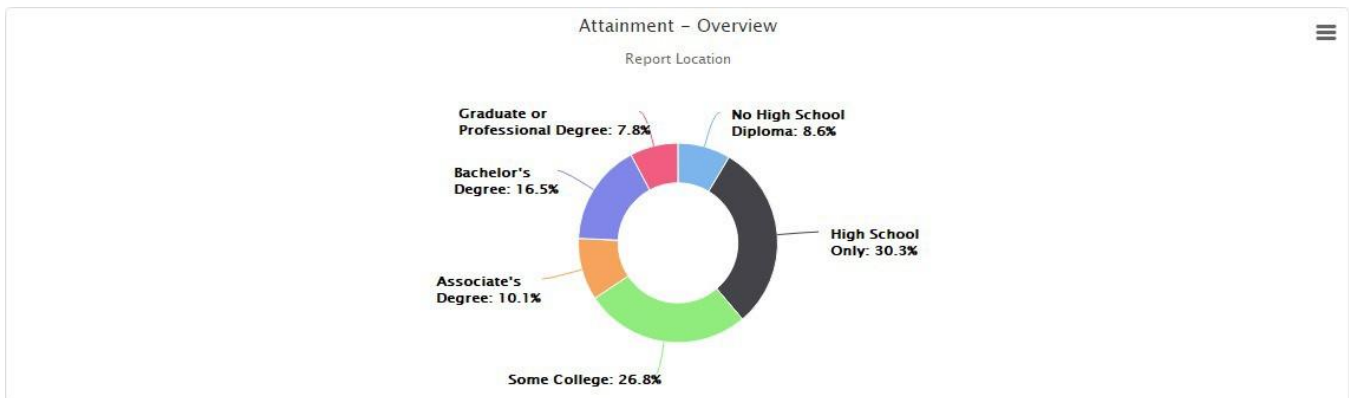

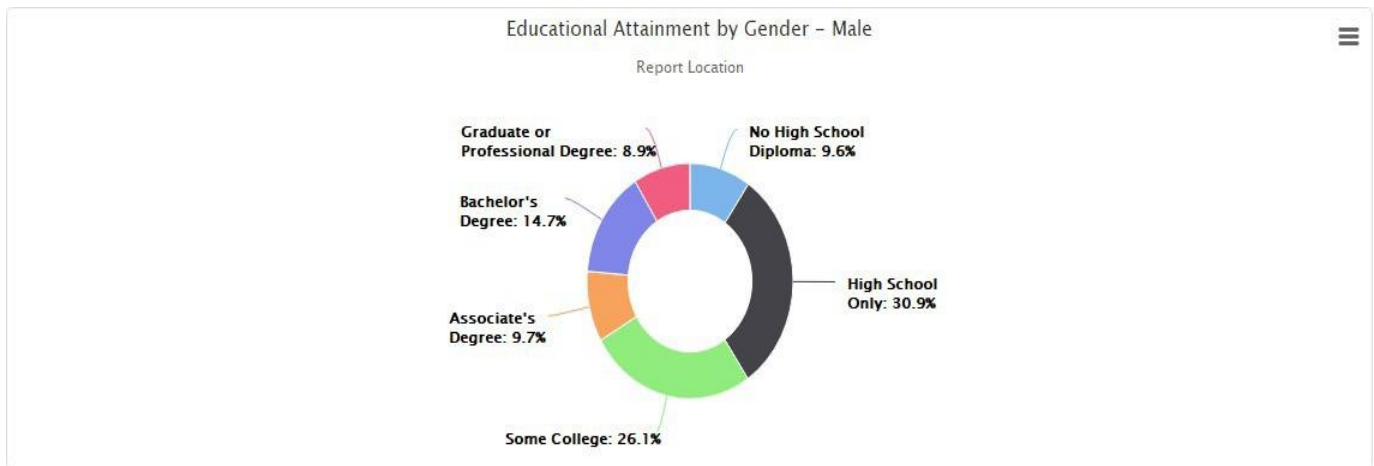

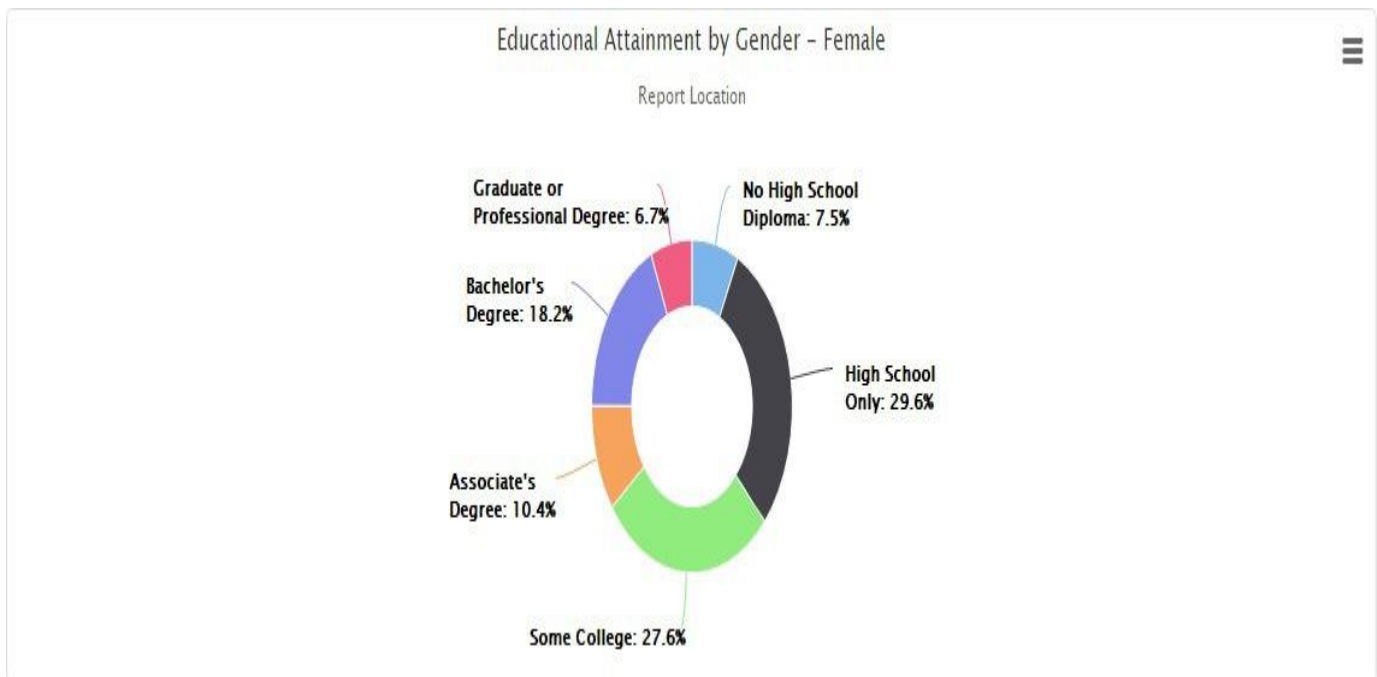

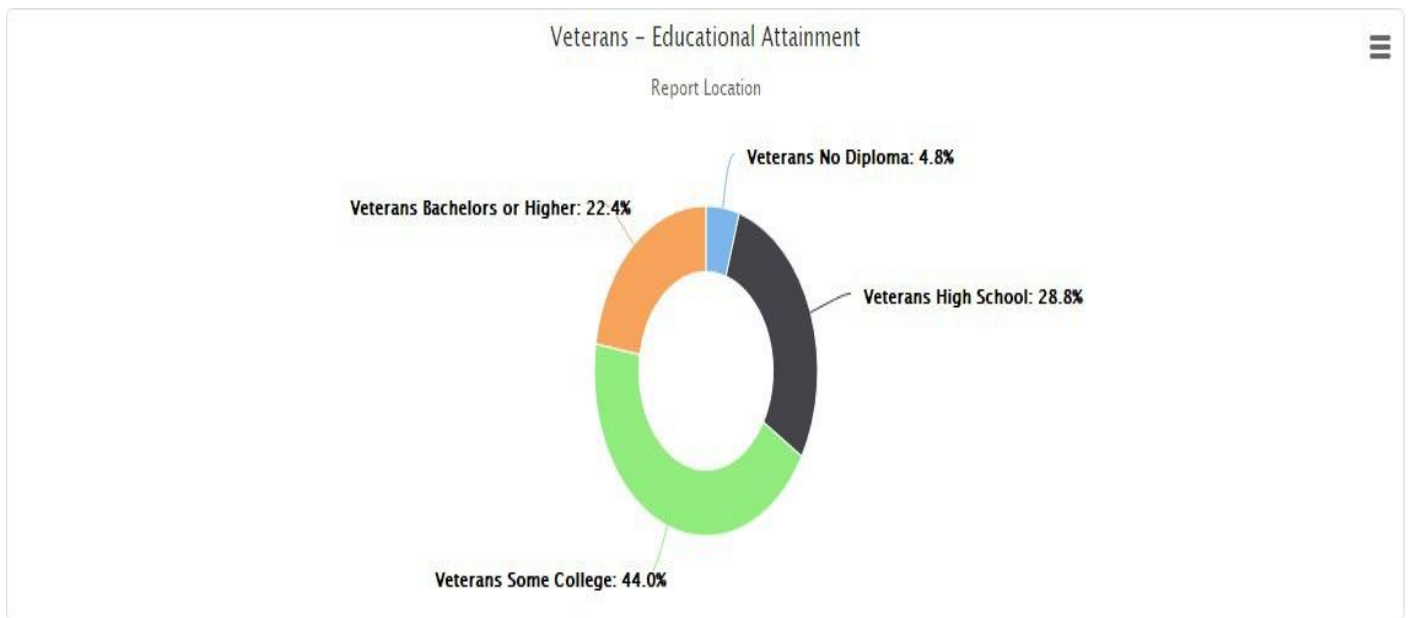

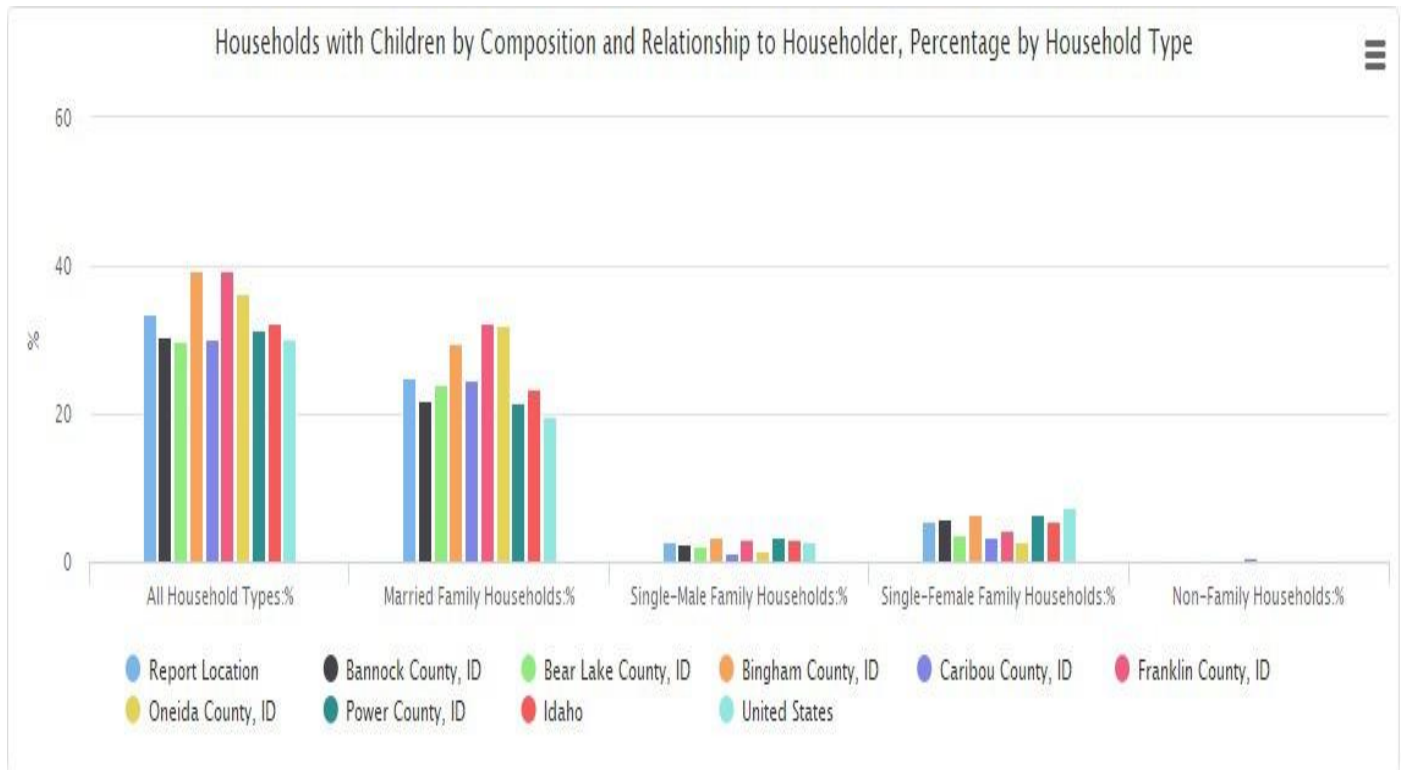

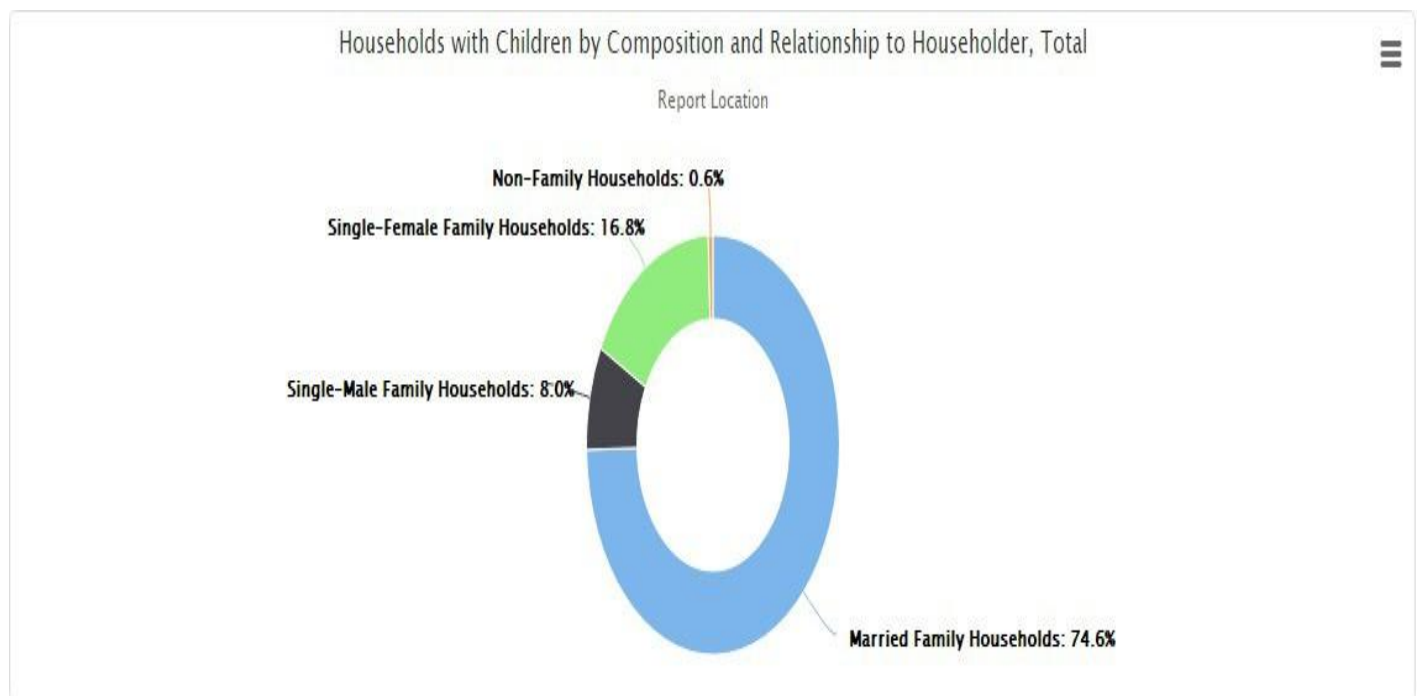

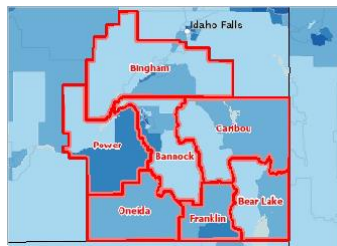

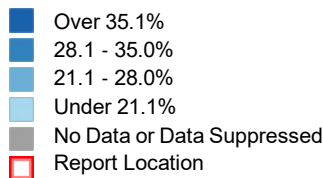

Cost Burdened Households (Housing Costs Exceed 30% of Household Income), Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22



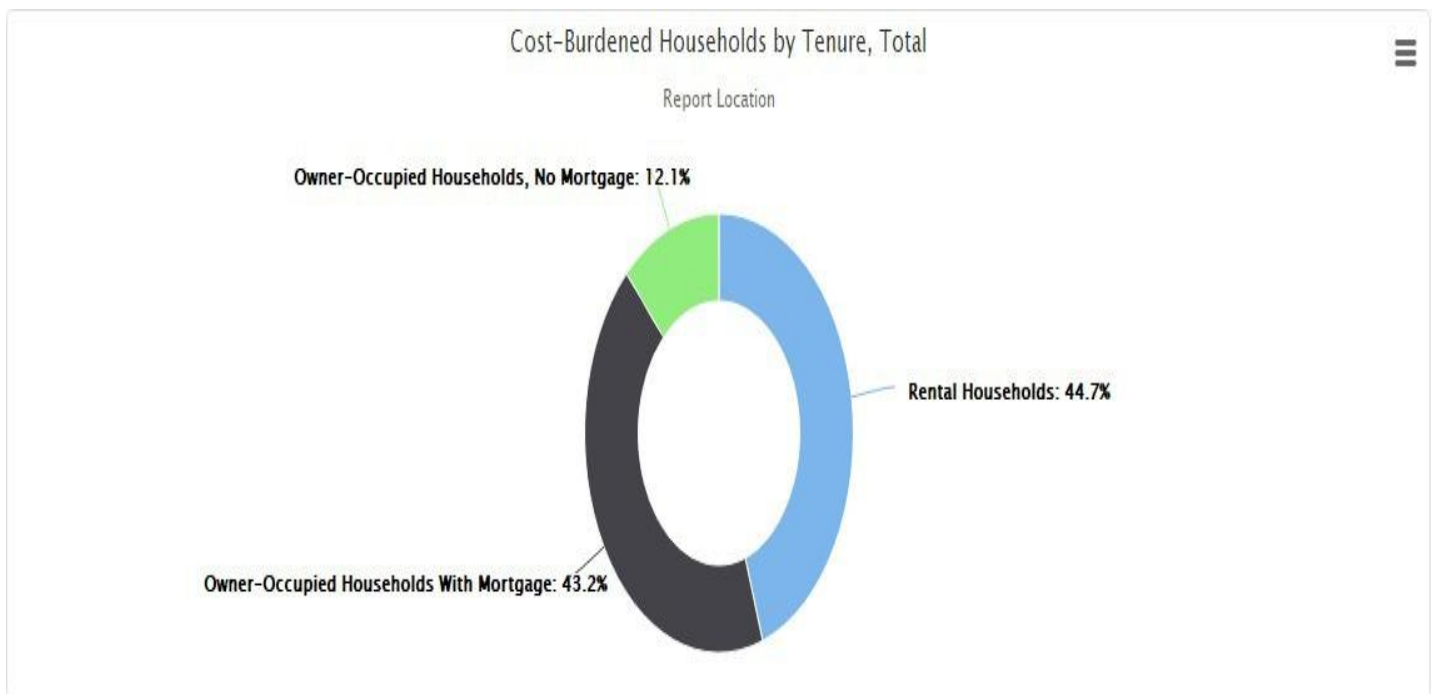

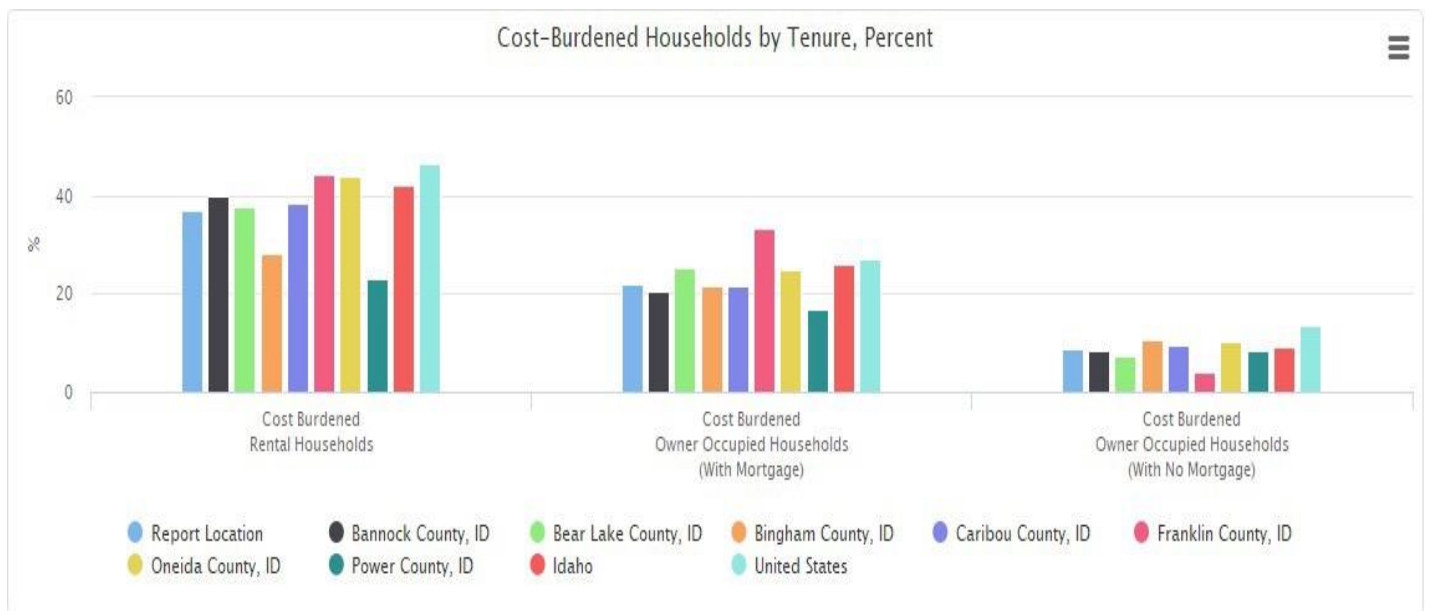

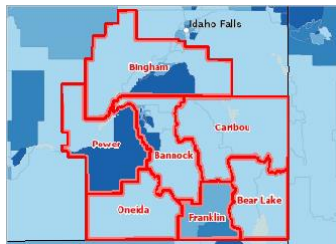

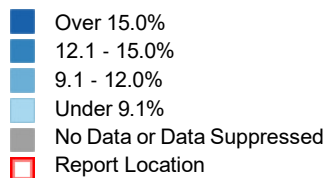

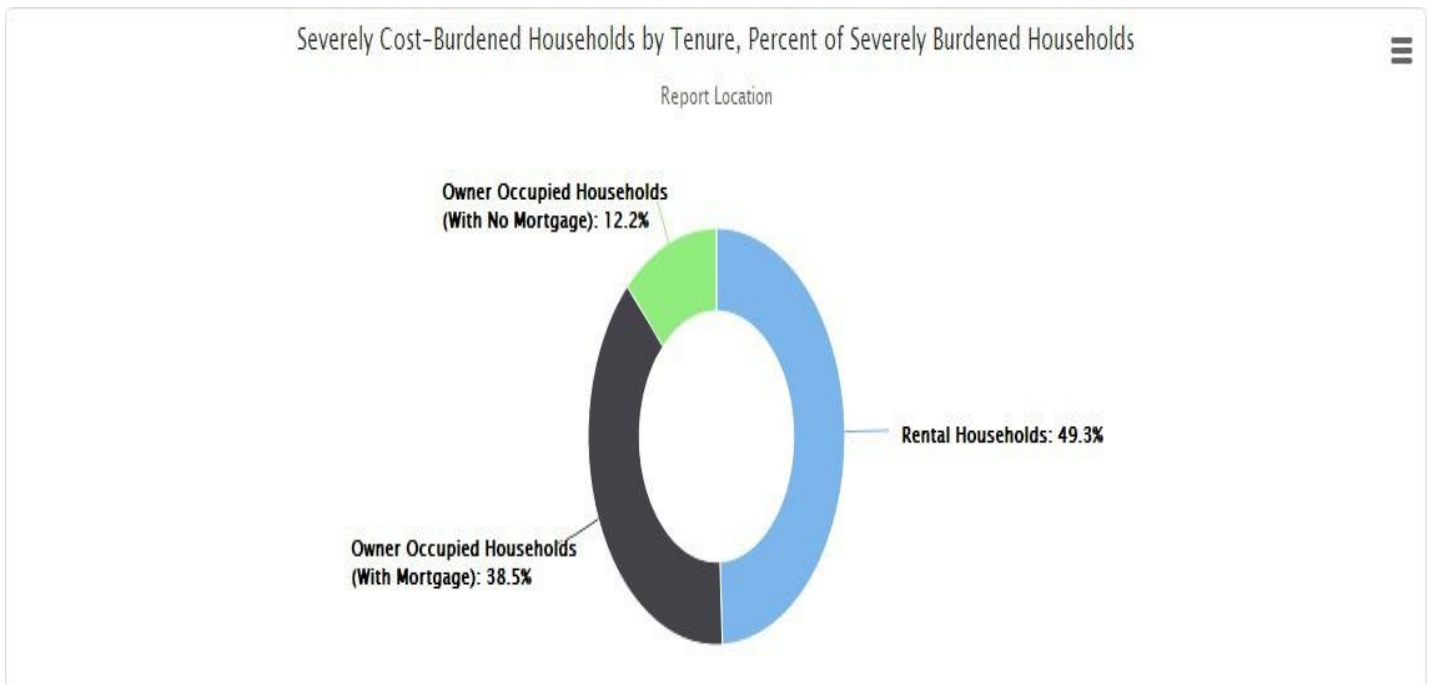

Single Parent Households with Children (Age 0-17), Percent by Tract, ACS 2018- 22



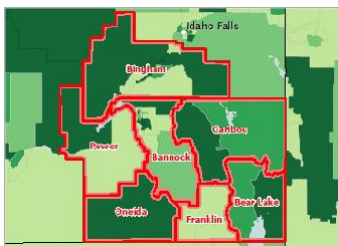

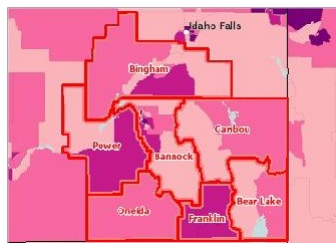

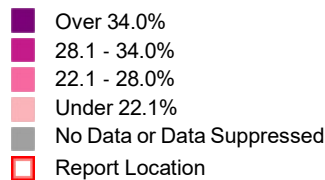

Substandard Housing Units, Percent of Total by Tract, ACS 2018-22



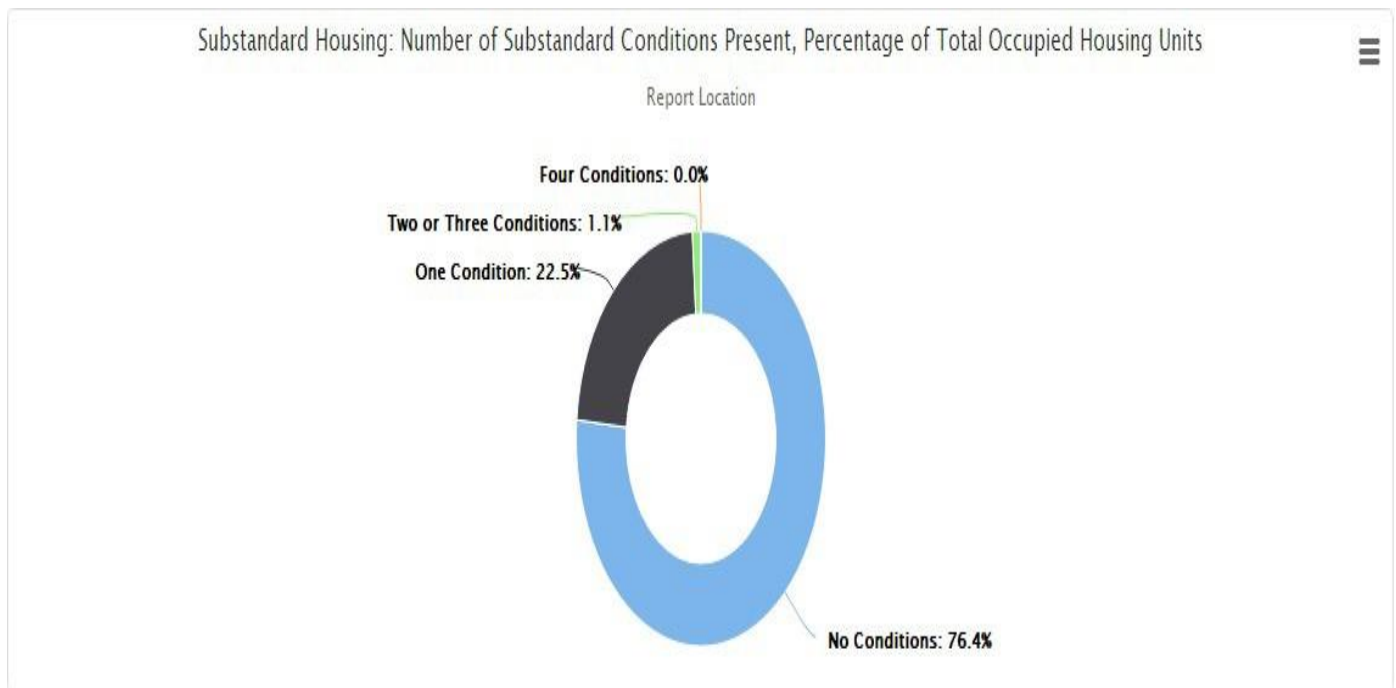

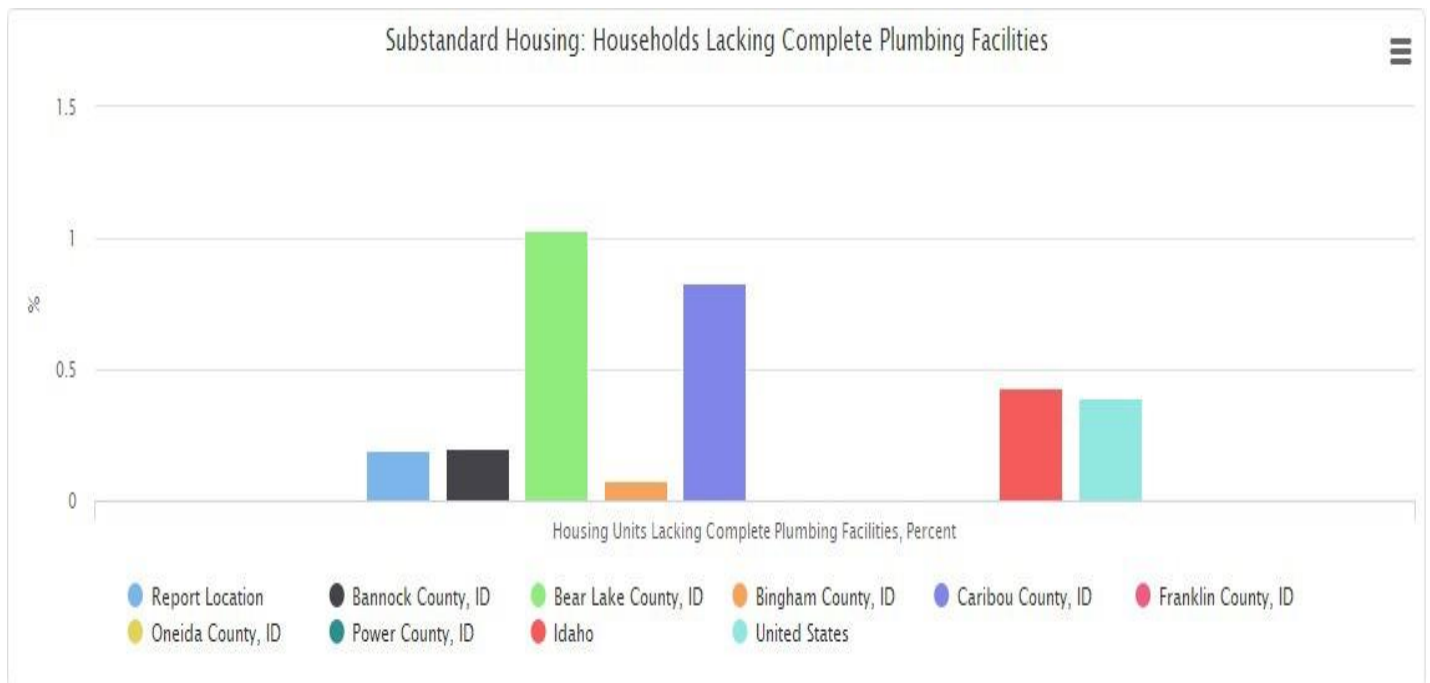

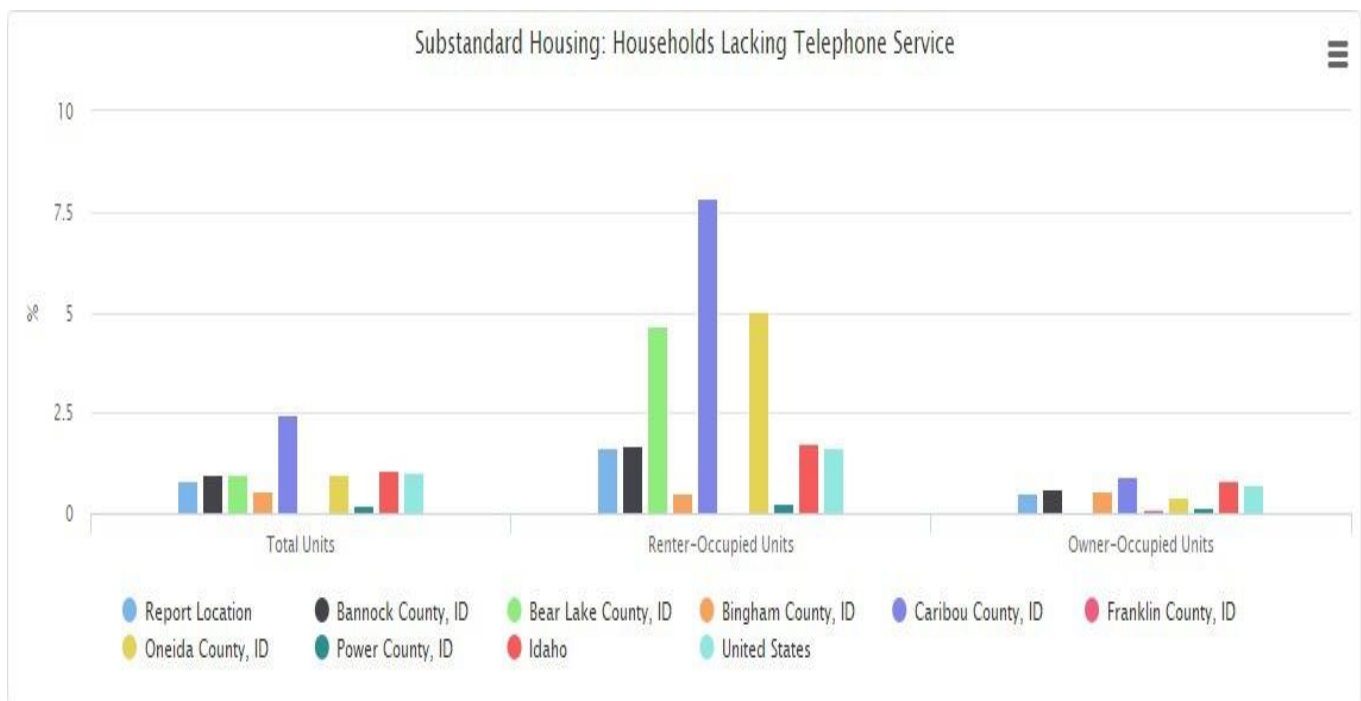

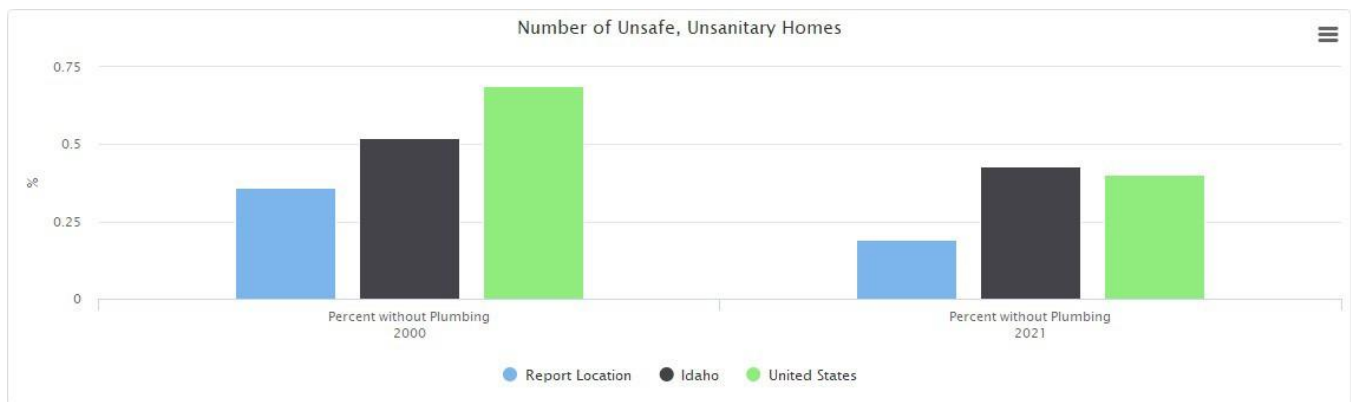
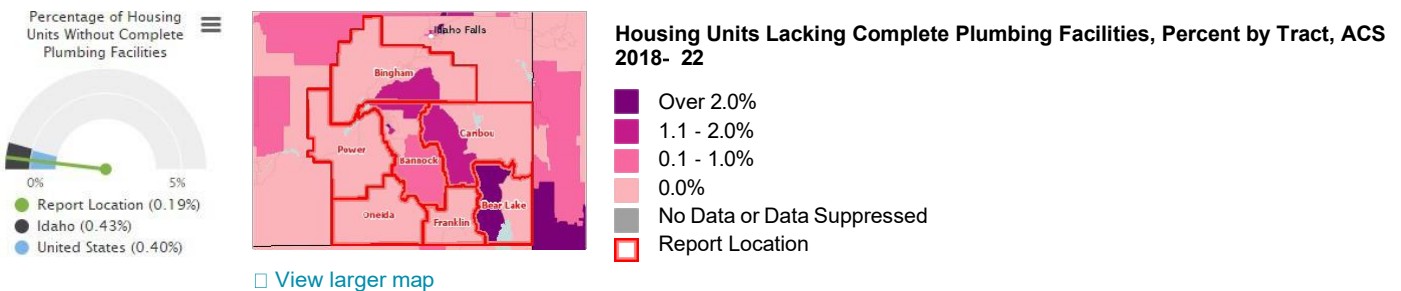


Number of Unsafe, Unsanitary Homes

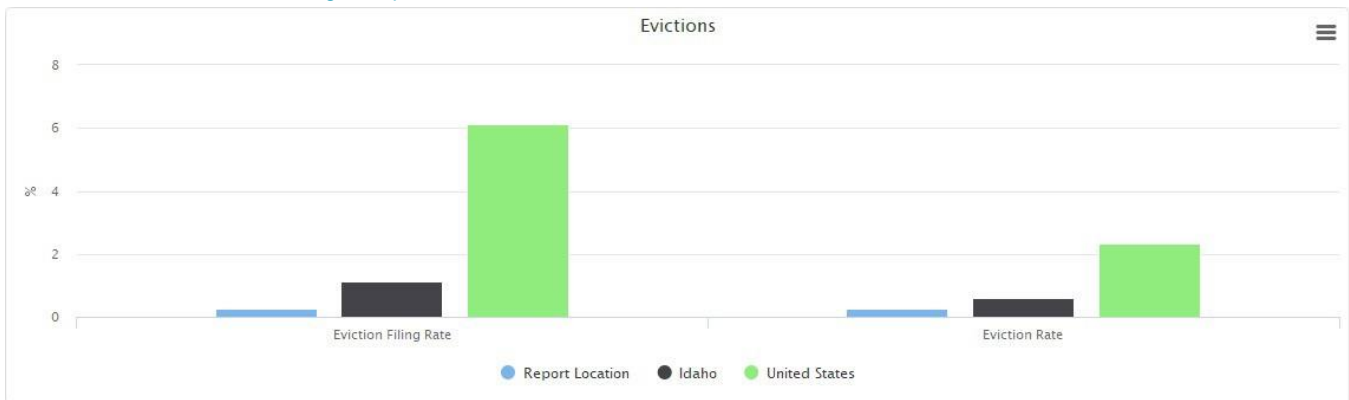
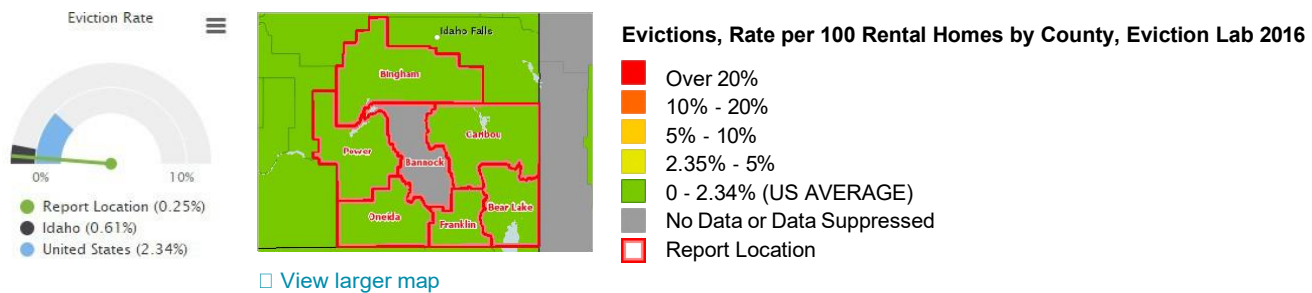
Evictions

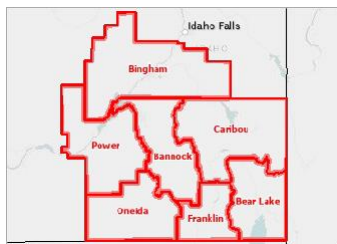

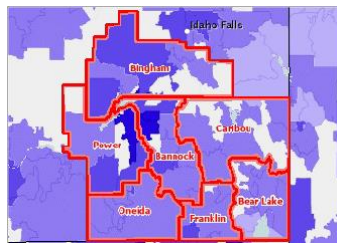

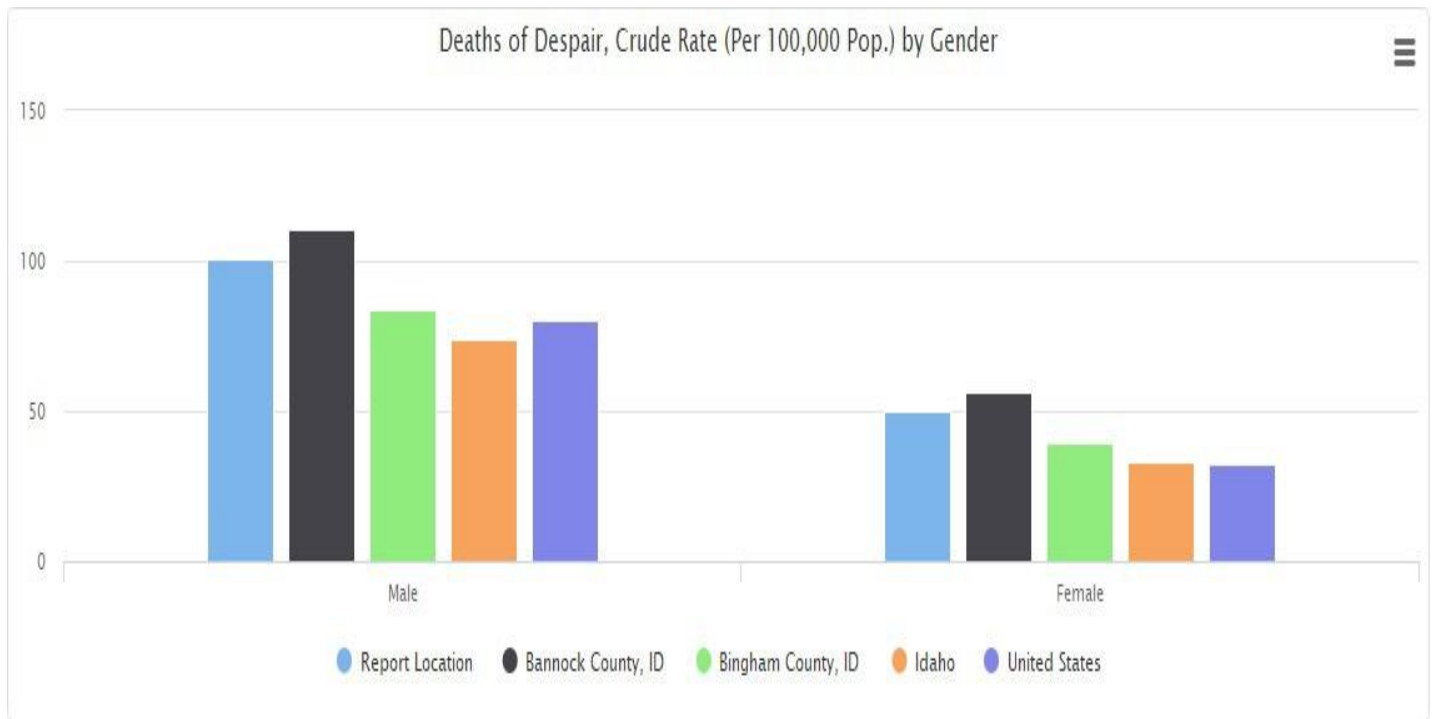

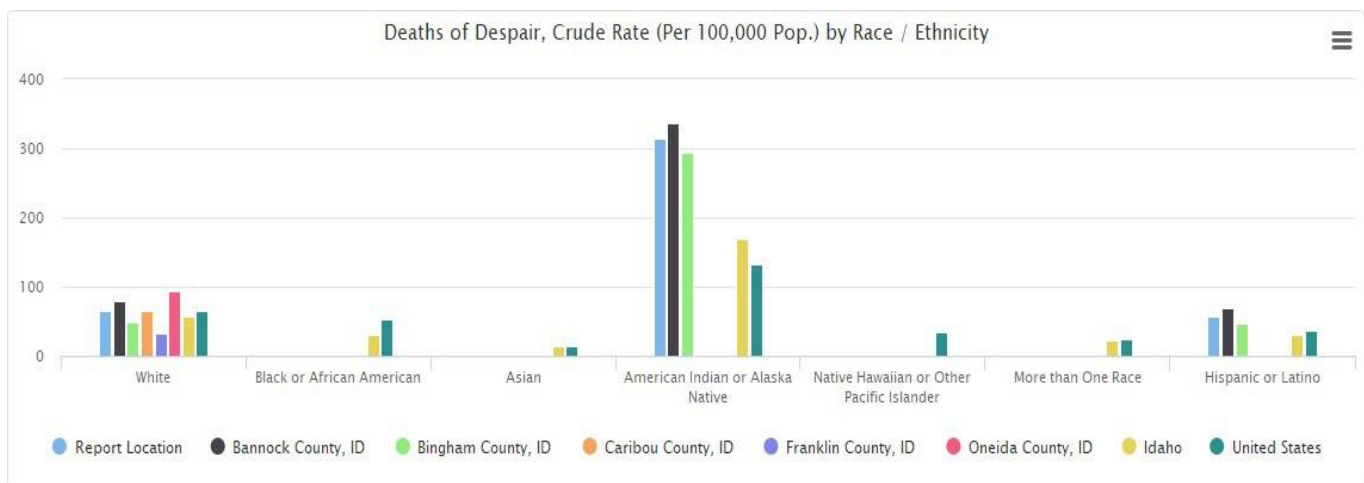

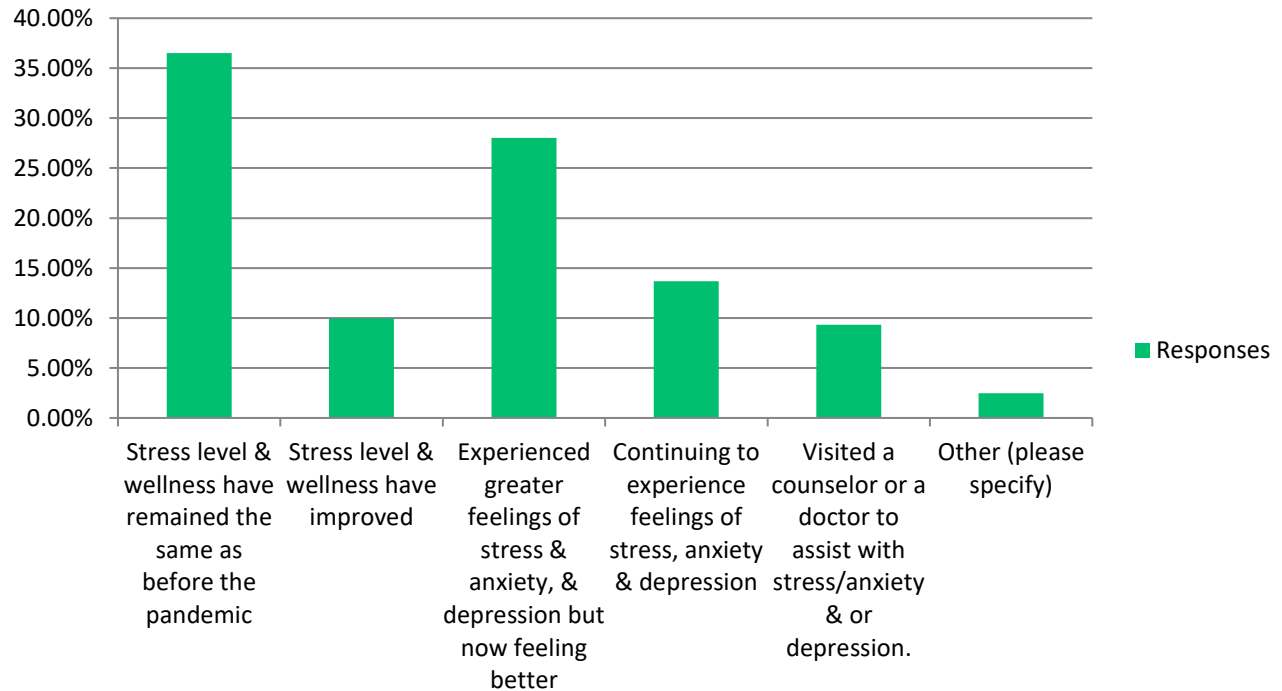
